Mrs. Ellen Byrnes

After about three weeks illness, Mrs. Ellen Byrnes passed away in Belleville General Hospital last Friday forenoon. Her illness followed an unfortunate accident in which she fell and fractured her hip. She was in her 81st year and had resided in Marmora for thirty-nine years. The deceased was born in Throoptown and was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Gehan, early pioneers of that district, who came to Canada from Ireland. There was a family of twelve children of whom Mr. James Gehan of Marmora is the only survivor.

The late Mrs. Byrnes was for some years housekeeper and hostess for the late Rev. Father Thomas Murtagh and made many friends, who held her in high esteem for her many fine qualities. Deeply interested in every phase of the services of Sacred Heart Church, she assisted in many of its activities, including the Altar Society and the Catholic Women's League. Kindly and sympathetic, she was always ready to help those in trouble or any good cause, until advancing years made it necessary for her to give up many of her activities.

Her husband, the late Thomas Byrnes, predeceased her forty-eight years ago. She is survived by one son, Timothy J. Byrnes, Marmora, one brother, James E. Gehan, also of Marmora, and three grandsons.

The funeral was held Monday morning, High Requiem Mass being sung by Rev. H. J. Farrell. The members of the Catholic Women's League, of which the deceased was a member, formed a guard of honor.

The many spiritual offerings and beautiful flowers were an evidence of the esteem in which she was held.

Interment took place in Sacred Heart demetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. M. J. O'Connor, E. D. O'Connor, Dan Shannon, George Forestell, John O'Neill and S. Stephens.

Among the out-of-town relatives in attendance at the funeral were Mrs. R. W. Voute and Miss Susie Kennedy, of Ottawa, Mrs. Harry Bell and Mrs. Lawrence Burke of Brockville, and Mr. John Gehan and son, Lorne, of Tweed.

Some remarks by Elaine Gehan O'Neill - A deceased brother of Ellen Byrnes, Mr. Peter Gehan, Throoptown, was father of John Henry Gehan, my father. Therefore, Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Gehan were my great grandparents and came from Ireland. Ellen Byrnes was called Nellie (Aunt Nellie to me). She was my godmother and Captain Edmund Eugene O'Neill was my godfather. Ellen Byrnes was also housekeeper for the priest in Tweed for some time. Tom Byrnes has an old prayer book of Ellen Byrnes inscribed "Tweed 1901". At that time the priest in Tweed was Father D. A. Twomey. Ellen Byrnes' husband, Thomas Byrnes, died in 1894, as per Ellen's obituary.

Kingston Vicar-General Victim of Motor Accident

KINGSTON, Jan. 30 — Rt. Rev. L. J. Byrne, D.P., vicar-general of the Archdiocese of Kingston and pastor of St. John's Church here, was instantly killed today in a collision on No. 7 Highway west of Marmora. He and Msgr. J. P. Sullivan, rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, were returning from the funeral of Msgr. J. V. McAuley in Lindsay in a blinding snowstorm. Msgr. Sullivan was not seriously injured.

The funeral Mass will be celebrated in St. John's Church here Thursday Feb. 2 at 10.30 a.m. Archbishop J. A. O'Sullivan will officiate.

Msgr. Byrne was born at Erinsville Feb. 2, 1899, the son of the late Sylvester Byrne and Elizabeth Kehoe. He was educated at St. Alexander's College, Ironsides, Quebec, and St. Augustine's Seminary, Toronto. He was ordained June 14, 1924.

After a year as assistant at St. Patrick's Church, Fort William, he went to Rome for graduate study, and obtained doctorate degrees in philosophy, theology and canon law. He returned to Kingston in 1929 with the late Archbishop M. J. O'Brien, who had just been appointed Coadjutor-Archbishop of Kingston. He served as secretary to Archbishop O'Brien until 1941, when he was appointed pastor of the newly established St. John's parish. He was chancellor of the Diocese from 1929 until last November, when he became vicar-general. In 1942 he was named a domestic prelate. During World War II he served as part time chaplain in the RCAF.

In addition to his diocesan and parochial duties, he served as diocesan director of the Catholic Women's League and Faithful Friar of the James Vincent Cleary Assembly Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus. He was a member

Martha is an active member of the Catholic Women's League, a generous donor and a worker for the parish annual bazaars, and occasional meal organizer for pastor and visiting priests at the rectory.

After the Saturday evening mass said for their intentions in their parish in Marmora, parishioners joined with Father Brennan in offering their congratulations, best wishes, love and prayers to Martha and Tom.

In the death early on Wednesday evening last at his home at 2 Glencairn Avenue, of Thomas Burns, North Toronto lost one of her oldest and finest citizens. The deceased gentleman who was in his 76th year, was born in Brockville, where his early life was spent and where he was married to Elizabeth A. Delaney who survives him. Almost thirty-five years ago he came to Toronto to accept the appointment of chief Engineer at the Parliament Buildings, a position he held with honor to himself and satisfaction to the various Governments under which he served, until his superannuation a few years ago. His health had not been good for some time, a heart condition confining him to his bed from time to time, but his condition had seemed somewhat improved of late and he was up and around until Sunday morning last when he was seized with a stroke from which he never rallied.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons, Morgan and Dr. Thomas both of Toronto, and Herbert, of Philadelphia; and three daughters, Mrs. William Whalen, of Thornhill; Mrs. Fraser, Falcon Street and Blanche at home.

DR. THOMAS O. BYRNES

Injured in a traffic accident 10 days ago on Queen St. near Dovercourt Rd., Dr. Thomas O. Byrnes, 41 a member of the staff of the Ontario Mental Hospital, 999 Queen St. W., died at his home Saturday night. He lived at 465 Dovercourt Rd. Dr. Smirle Lawson, chief coroner, said an inquest was under consideration. Dr. Byrnes was injured when a truck ran over his foot and also severely injured his side. At the time of the injury he was reported to be suffering from Addison's disease, a rare ailment afflicting the pituitary gland.

Born in Toronto, Dr. Byrnes received his early education at De La Salle School. He graduated in medicine in 1932 from the University of Toronto. For three years he practiced at the Eldorado Mines, Great Bear Lake. He had been with the Ontario Hospital, Queen St. W., since 1935.

Surviving are his widow, the former Marion Shannon; a daughter, Mary Elizabeth; a son, Tommy Daniel; his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Byrnes, Toronto; three sisters, Mrs. C. E. Fraser and Mrs. Jonn McCarron, both of Toronto, and Mrs. William Whalen, Thornhill, and two brothers, Morgan and Herbert Byrnes, both in the United States.

The funeral was held yesterday morning, requiem mass being conducted in St. Helen's church, Toronto at 9 a. m. Interment took place in Thornhill cemetery.
