

Charles Clemens active citizen

Well known resident dies

Requiem Mass was celebrated on Wednesday, January 30 at 2 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church, Marmora for Charles Francis Clemens, R. R. 2 Marmora, who died suddenly at Belleville General Hospital on Sunday, January 27. Mr. Clemens was in his 64th year.

Principal celebrant was his son Rev. Karl Clemens, who was assisted by Rev. Dean C. E. Baker of Tweed and Rev. T. G. Scanlon of Marmora. The eulogy was delivered by Rev. Victor Abegg of the Franciscan Order in Toronto. The choir was composed of seminarians from St. Augustine's in Scarborough.

Rev. J. G. Hanley represented Archbishop Wilhelm of Kingston and a great many other priests from the Diocese were present.

Entombment took place in Sacred Heart Cemetery vault. Bearers were Wilfred Terrion, Breen O'Connor Jr., William Doyle, Nicholi Dostanko, Jim Rutan and Joseph Campion.

Born at Lommel, Belgium, he came to Canada with his parents, the late John Peter Clemens and the late former Elizabeth Pennamans, in 1919. He received his education in Marmora Township.

Mr. Clemens was employ

ed by the Deloro Smelting & Refining Company and helped to organize the workers in 1956-7 in the United Steelworkers of America. He was president of Local 5375 for a number of years and for his efforts was made an honorary life member of the U.S.W.A.

He held the posts of president and secretary of the New Democratic party in Hastings riding and was N.D.P. candidate in the 1963 provincial election. He was later made an honorary life member of the N.D.P.

Mr. Clemens was also a past-president of the Marmora Minor Hockey Association.

He was a member of

Sacred Heart Church, the Holy Name Society and the Knights of Columbus.

He was the husband of former Genevieve Latendre and is survived by four sons, John David of Tweed, Robert Remi of Peterborough, Rev. Karl of Kingston and Terrence Eugene of R. R. 2 Marmora. There are 11 grandchildren.

Three sisters, Mrs. Sophia Van Heukelom, R. R. 2 Marmora, Mrs. Ralph (Catherine) Franklin of Queensboro, Mrs. Joseph (Nellie) Allen of Churchbridge, Saskatchewan, and two brothers Frank Clemens of Sturgeon Falls and Henry Clemens of R. R. 2 Marmora survive. One brother Alphonse, predeceased.

A prayer service was held at the Cassidy Funeral Home on Tuesday evening.

Funeral mass will be celebrated Thursday at 11 a.m. in St. Carthag's Church, Tweed for prominent area businessman and politician John Clemens.

Mr. Clemens, 60, died Saturday at his winter home in Clearwater, Florida.

Clemens was a long-time member of Tweed council, serving 20 years, including 15 as reeve and was also warden of Hastings County in 1980. He

retired from municipal politics in 1991. He was one of the original members of the Centre and South Hastings Waste Management Board. He also served for some time on the Belleville General Hospital Board.

In business, he was employed for many years in the insurance adjusting business locally, retiring some years ago and moving to Belleville where he resided at The Anchorage.

He was a member of the Knights of Columbus for almost 40 years, holding many senior offices, most recently that of "state deputy," or the highest rank within the fraternal order in Ontario. He was formally installed in that office in July of 1994, heading up more than 420 parish councils across Ontario with a total of more than 53,000 members.

Surviving besides his wife, the former Nina Reynolds, are his mother, Genevieve Richardson, and children Pat Clemens, Jackson Point; Kim (and Carl) Kehoe, Tweed; Paul (and Anne) Clemens, Jackson Point; John Clemens and Tracey Clemens, both of Kingston.
