George J. Cooks burial date of 1922 does not appear in the Church Burial Books. The date is on the huge cross upright monument , but not in the record books.

John Frederick Cook has two burial dates. 30 November 1916 on the huge cross upright monument and 5 December as a burial date in the Church Record books.

Is Laughlin Cook, Bridgetts husband buried at Sacred Heart Cemetery? No record in the Churches Burial Books.

Flying Officer T. J. Cook Died In Plane Crash

A former Marmora resident, Flying Officer T. J. Cook, was killed and his wireless pupil, L. A. C. E. W. Orr, of Vera, Sask., injured on Tuesday, July 8th, when the Menasco Moth training plane they were flying crashed at Lilyfield, about 8 miles northwest of Winnipeg. Royal Canadian Air Force headquarters reported.

Reason for the crash which occurred during a routine wireless instruction flight from the airmen's base at No. 3 Wireless Training School, Winnipeg, is not known. Flying Officer Cook was piloting the machine at the time, officials said.

L. A. C. Orr received facial lacerations and was taken to the hospital suffering from shock. He is expected to make a good recovery.

Flying Officer Thos. J. Cook was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Cook and was born and spent his early life on the homestead about three miles west of Marmora. He was popular with young and old alike. He enlisted in the air force in the first World War and after the present war started he again offered his services and was accepted. He served at Montreal for a time and went to Winnipeg about two months ago.

The late Thos. J. Cook was about forty-four years of age. He was married in the West and is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mary Ellen, 13; Geraldine Louise, 11, and Shirley Anne, 15. Messrs. Chas. and Donald Cook, who still reside on the homestead, are brothers and Mrs. George Auger, of Trenton, is a sister. The funeral took place at Winnipeg.

Bernard Cook Fatally Injured
