PRISONER ESCAPED

Last Saturday County Constables O. R. Jones and H. Gillen received a request from Frankford to arrest a man named Ed. Howard, who was wanted at that place on a very serious charge. They found the accused at the home of his father-in-law, Mr. John Cronkright, and after a brief resistance placed the handcuffs on him and brought him in an auto as far as the town hall with the intention of locking him up. Constable Gillen got out to unlock the hall door and while he was engaged in opening the inner one, the prisoner made a bolt for liberty.

He succeeded in reaching the woods south of the Catholic church and evaded his pursuers. Howard is still at liberty and is reported to have got rid of the handcuffs and there is also a report that he secured food at a farm house not far from the Village. As the extreme penalty for the crime with which the accused is charged is life imprisonment, he will probably make strenuous efforts to escape. Some months ago a warrant was issued for the arrest of Howard on a charge of bootlegging and other offences, but he escaped to the States and just returned recently. It is also stated that a reward of \$100 has been offered for his capture.

HUGH GILLEN

After several months illness Hugh Gillen passed away at his home in the village last Saturday. He had served Marmora long and faithfully in various capacities and was highly esteemed by many present and former residents of the village. He was in his 72nd year, but until about the beginning of the year enjoyed good health and was more active than many men several years younger. In opening the water wheel for a fire, when it had become blocked in some way, he strained himself and never recovered from the effects.

The late Hugh Gillen was born in Port Kennedy, Montgomery Co . Penn , on October 22nd, 1862, the san of James and Ellen Gillen. He came to Marmora as a young man and had been a continuous resident of the village since. that time. As a young man he was employed as a shantyman and teamster and also worked as a carpenter at varions jobs. When cement came into general use he became expert in the mixing of concrete and was in charge of the construction of a considerable part of the cement walks in the village. He also did quite a lot of other concrete work in the village and surrounding country He had the reputation of being a good workman and absolutely dependable.

Except for a considerably short period the late Mr. Gillen was village constable for over thirty years and he also held various other offices, including that of truant officer, caretaker of the townhall, supervisor of the walks and streets, etc., and in recent years also caretaker of the Memorial building and fire protection equipment. His duties appeared to be unceasing and at times his hours were very long, but there was no complaining.

During the years the writer was village clerk, he was closely associated with the late Mr. Gillen in various village affairs and came to know him well. Rebind his sometimes gruff exterior, which was often assumed because of his duties as constable, one found a kindly heart, a keen sense of humor and a fondness for children. He was always prompt and courteous in responding to any instructions issued by the Council. His services as truant officer were particularly worthy of mention.

The late Hugh Gillen is survived by his wife and three daughters—Mrs. James Wilson, Campbellford; Mrs. John Doyle, Marmora township; and Miss Ida at home. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Abe Smith, Marmora; three balf brothers, Harry and Daniel Fraser, of Ardmore, Pa.; and two half sisters, Mrs. Peter Kelly, Ardmore, Pa.; and Mrs. Joseph Kelly, Penpfield, Pa.

The funeral was held on Monday morning from his late residence and proceeded to Sacred Heart Church for requiem Mass. Interment took place in R. C. cemetery.
