CANADA HAS 27,779

DUTCH OR BELGIANS

Ottawa, May 10—There are nearly 28,000 native-born Belgians and Netherlanders now resident in Canada. About 16,000 of these are still nationals of those countries.

Of the 148,962 Canadian residents who claim Holland as their racial origin, 10,736 were born there and 7,210 remain nationals of that country. Residents of Belgian racial origin number 27,585, of whom 17,033 were born in Belgium and 8,952 remain nationals of that country.

Prince Felix of Luxemburg was in Canada last summer and visited the late Lord Tweedsmuir, then governor-general, at Ottawa.

LOUIS PETER HULSMANS

The sudden passing of Louis Peter Hulsmans of Marmora Township came as a shock to his many friends in this area. Mr. Hulsmans had been in fairly good health to all appearances and had gone out Friday morning to cut wood at his wood lot. He did not return home at noon and when his sons went to see what happened they found him lying against the wood pile, having suffered a stroke. Medical aid was summoned and he was rushed by ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough but he failed to recover and passed away on Monday, Oct. 1st.

The late Louis Hulsmans was born in Belgium 54 years ago, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hulsmans who reside in Peterborough at the present time.

The Hulsmans family came to Canada after the First World War and settled in Marmora Township.

For quite a number of years Louis Hulsmans was employed at the Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Plant. He also had a farm and about ten years ago he left Deloro and has since been engaged in farming.

In 1924 he was married to Mary Johana Doyle and eleven children were born to the union. He was a member of the Sacred Heart Church and belonged to the Holy Name Society and the Knights of Columbus. He was a faithful member of Marmora Agricultural Society and was always on hand to assist with any of their projects. He was widely known and held in high esteem by all who knew him.

Besides his wife he is survived by seven sons and four daughters as follows: William Louis Hulsmans, Peterborough; Joseph Thomas, Marmora; Frederick Charles, Toronto; Mrs. Harold Willman (Ellen Annie) Marmora; Mrs. Gordon Eggett (Dorothy) Marmora; Leo Albert, Marmora; Henry Francis, David Ambrose, Mary Jean Isabell, Lawrence Vincent and Margaret Lorraine all of Marmora Township.

Smith, 55, was driving his son's new car to him in Michigan when it skidded off Highway 2 six miles east of here, plunged into a five-foot ditch, and crashed side-on into a tree.

Killed were his wife, 57, and grandson George Smith, 12, of Pickering.

The boy's father, George Smith, Sr., an engineer recently went to work temporarily at Ann Arbor, Mich. His wife, Elizabeth, was visiting him.

George, Jr., was staying with his grandparents. He was an only son.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith were taking the boy with them to visit his parents.

"It was to be a double surprise for them — George and the new car," said a friend of the family.

George died instantly in the wrecked car. Mrs. Smith died in Woodstock General Hospital.

Each of the watches was suitably engraved to mark the occasion.

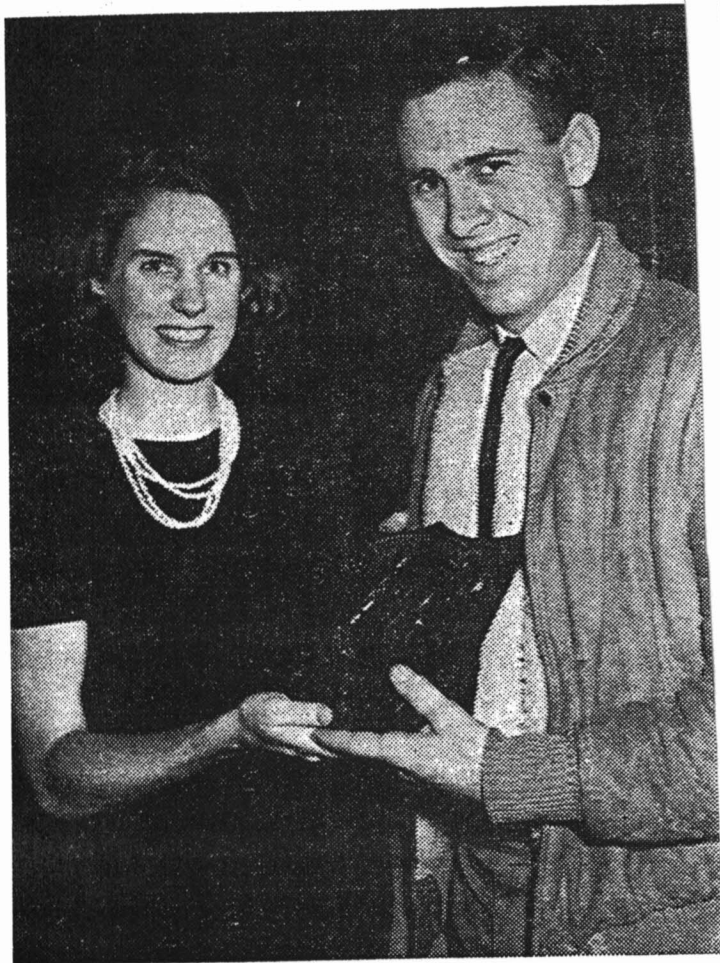
