In the death of Mr. Kilpatrick the Ivanhoe community has lost a prominent and highly esteemed resident and to many friends his passing has brought sincere feelings of regret. In the affairs of the district he took an active part and in the Loyal Orange Lodge he held a high place, being a member of Downey Lodge No. 425, at White Lake, the Royal Black Preceptory at White Lake and at the time of his death he was County Master of the Order for Centre Hastings. In conducting the affairs of the Township of Huntingdon, Mr. Kilpatrick gave his best services and for the past ten years and up to the time of his death he held the office of Township Clerk. In religion he was a member of the United Church at Ivanhoe and in politics he was a staunch Conservative.

Mr. Kilpatrick, who was in his 53rd year, was born at White Lake and resided in the district all his life. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. John Kilpatrick.

Surviving him are his wife, who prior to her marriage was Miss Lillian A. Downey; one daughter, Miss Hilda Kilpatrick, who is a student at Tweed High School; three brothers, Mr. Norman Kilpatrick, of Deloro; Mr. Wellington Kilpatrick, of Belleville, and Mr. Earl Kilpatrick, of Ivanhoe.

WARDEN G. CHRYSLER

The death of one of Marmora's most well known and highly respected citizens occurred in Peterborough Civic Hospital, on Saturday evening, in the person of Warden George Chrysler, in his 56th year.

He was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage on Friday while out in the yard at his home and had to be carried into the house, by neighbors. Dr. R. C. Shatford attended him.

His condition did not improve and on Saturday he was conveyed to the hospital where he passed away that evening.

The late Mr. Chrysler was born in Belmont Township, the son of the late William James Chrysler and Amanda Ellis. He attended Cordova Mines Public School. For thirty-five years he was employed by Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. Ltd. where for many years he was a foreman in the Oxide Department.

Upon leaving Deloro he operated a small grocery store in Peterborough for a short time following which he returned to Marmora and for a short time was employed by the C.N.R. Due to ill health he was forced to retire a couple of years ago. He was of friendly nature and popular with all who knew him.

The deceased was twice married, his first wife being Iva Kilpatrick, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard Kilpatrick of Marmora Township, one son, Kenneth, of Belleville, survives of his marriage. Later he was married to Pearl Wilkes, daughter of George Wilkes and the late Mrs. Wilkes, who is left to mourn his loss. Of this marriage there are three children, all at home Marlon, Robert and James.

He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. William Chrysler, Hastings, two brothers, Wilfred and Wellington. Hastings, and one sister, Mrs. William Chamberland, (Wealthy) Peterborough.

The late Mr. Chrysler was a member of St. Andrew's United Church, serving as an elder for some years. He was a Past Master of Marmora Lodge A.F. & A.M No 222 under whose auspices the funeral was held. He was also a Past Principal of Madoc Chapter Royal Arch Masons.
