MRS. GEORGE LOGAN Marmora

MARMORA — A life-long resident of Marmora township and village passed away on April 22nd in the person of Mrs. Mary Josephine Logan, widow of the late George Logan who predeceased her in April 1952. She had been ill for the past two years.

Mrs. Logan was born on Christmas Day 86 years ago and was a twin of the late Frederick Burns who predeceased her some eleven years ago. They were children of the late John Burns and Jessie Carpentier and were baptized in the old Roman Catholic church across the river, now in ruins.

For many years Mr. and Mrs. Logan farmed in the Shanick Settlement, Marmora Township. Of a kindly nature, Mrs. Logan was a good neighbor and was held in high esteem by all who knew her. For the past few years she had resided with her daughter, Miss Irene in the village and in spite of ill health she had a cheery smile and friendly word for all.

She was a member of the Sacred Heart Church, Marmora and a former member of the CWL and Altar Society.

She is survived by four daughters and six sons as follows: Mrs. Harry Carter (Delia), Toronto; Mrs. Fred Ferguson (Margaret) Stirling; Miss Irene at home; Mrs. William Dainerd (Marie), Campbellford; Dennis and Leo, Toronto; John of Belleville; Arthur of Peterborough; Charles and Michael of Marmora.

The funeral was held Thursday from her home to Sacred Heart church for Requiem Mass at 10.00 a.m. conducted by Rev. W. P. Healey, P. P. Interment was in Marmora Sacred Heart Cemetery.

The pall bearers were Peter Quinn, Joseph Dubord, Elmer Moffat, Morris Lynch, John Goodrich and Carl Heath.

The honor of being the oldest male resident of Marmora village of Irish descent is held by George Logan. George, who was given no additional Christian name and submits that one is enough, is now in his 89th year. He was born in Asphodel township on June 15th, 1860.

About forty years of his life were spent in Shanick, in the north section of Marmora township, from whence he returned to the village a few years ago. His father, James Logan, was a native of Otonabee township, and his mother, Mary Ann Carey, with her two brothers, came to Otonabee township from their native Ireland.

Irish Pioneers

One does not converse for long with George for long before detecting his Irish accent. Most of his stories of old residents of the village centre around members of Irish families such as the late Captain John O'Neill and others who were interesting folk of four decades ago.

George attended the North school in Asphodel township which entails a walk of two and a half miles from his home. His first teacher was a Miss Udy. He recalls that the scholars became so unruly under her that a big man from Hastings, whose name he has forgotten, took over her duties and maintained discipline.

Breaking in Oxen

George was quite young when he left school to help his father on the farm. His father, who used oxen, could not plough alone. Also the son broke in oxen for the plough when they were two years old. "I remember my first day's work away from home," he said. "I picked hops for Mrs. Thomas Parker of Norwood. The pay for 50 cents for filling a box about 3 feet square. Not only did I get my 50 cents, but she also gave me a little pig, which I thought was very good of her."

In later years, George worked in the lumber camps of the Rathbun and Gilmour Companies, and also received employment with jobbers. He has also done some gold mining in his time. He worked at the Borth Gold Mine at Ardoch, Ontario, for about three years. This mine, operated by an American company, closed up and all buildings were demolished when the vein ran out. George has the impression that other gold awaits discovery thereabouts yet.

He was also employed at Cordova Gold Mines for two years and at Deloro for one year. He worked on the erection of the Sacred Heart Church and the parish priest's residence and earned for himself the title of "the strong man."

Never Hunted or Fished

He says that he never hunted or fished, as he never could find any time for either sport. He did have time for dances and indulged in a little step dancing in his and more contented with their lot in those bygone days than now. Mrs. Logan, to whom he was married about 60 years ago has also lived an industrious life. Before marriage she was Josephine Burns, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Burns of Marmora. They have had 10 children nine of whom are living. George speaking of himself at his advanced age, remarked that the only thing which bothered him was to shave. His final observation related to the present season. "This is a wonderful spring and in all my years I do not remember a better one."

George was quite young when he left school to help his father on the farm. His father, who used oxen, could not plough alone. Also the son broke in oxen for the plough when they were two years old. "I remember my first day's work away from home," he said. "I picked hops for Mrs. Thomas Parker of Norwood. The pay for 50 cents for filling a box about 3 feet square. Not only did I get my 50 cents, but she also gave me a little pig, which I thought was very good of her."

In later years, George worked in the lumber camps of the Rathbun and Gilmour Companies, and also received employment with jobbers. He has also done some gold mining in his time. He worked at the Borth Gold Mine at Ardoch, Ontario, for about three years. This mine, operated by an American company, closed up and all buildings were demolished when the vein ran out. George has the impression that other gold awaits discovery thereabouts yet.

He was also employed at Cordova Gold Mines for two years and at Deloro for one year. He worked on the erection of the Sacred Heart Church and the parish priest's residence and earned for himself the title of "the strong man."

Never Hunted or Fished

He says that he never hunted or fished, as he never could find any time for either sport. He did have time for dances and indulged in a little step dancing in his

and more contented with their lot in those bygone days than now. Mrs. Logan, to whom he was married about 60 years ago has also lived an industrious life. Before marriage she was Josephine Burns, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Burns of Marmora. They have had 10 children nine of whom are living. George speaking of himself at his advanced age, remarked that the only thing which bothered him was to shave. His final observation related to the present season. "This is a wonderful spring and in all my years I do not remember a better one."

Miss Logan was born to George and Mary Logan in Marmora, and resided in this area all her life.
