They proceeded to amuse themselves upsetting things in general. The teacher's desk was ransacked, the books all thrown in confusion, and her jack-knife taken from the desk drawer and placed in one of the boys pockets. The maps, weights and measures and all school equipment was roughly handled and thrown about the floor. Ink was poured about the school in several places and the clock put clean out of business. The pupils books were removed from their desks and a number of them defaced by drawings and writings.

Just as they were ready to leave the building the teacher arrived on the scene, saw the two in the schoolhouse and went to see what was going on. The two young men Gordon Bedore and Tom McCinnon took a hasty departure through the window and jumped the school yard fence. The teacher looked the school house over and missed her jack-knife. Meanwhile the two intruders were firing random shots with their gun. The teacher went to the school fence and demanded her knife but Bedore and McCinnon ran away and hid.

The teacher hid in the school. After a while McCinnon came stealthily back and was in the act of placing the stolen knife in the entry of the school house when the teacher appeared. Bedore was waiting at the school gate for the return of McCinnon. The teacher advised the two to put everything back to its place in the schoolhouse. She unlocked the door. The two young men entered and started to put things to rights. You would naturally think that after being "fairly caught" they would have had the principle (or good sense) to put everything back into place but they left before completing their work. I think it would be wise for them to look up the penalty for disturbing school property.

As a small child on the McKinnon farm at Crowe Lake I remember relatives appearing on the doorstep, summer after summer, looking for kin or renewing childhood friendships. Some were pursuing their family tree. I was always fascinated by their tales and questions.

My mother had her share of relations: Gallaghers from Copper Cliff and Connors from Saskatchewan. They were always welcomed with anticipation and warmth. There was a lot of reminiscing, card games, laughter, and each time we had to gather for the inevitable "picture taking".

When Dad's family of McKinnons and Murrays arrived it was a slightly different picture. Perhaps it was the mixture of Scottish and Irish.

Their strong sense and curiosity of family background no doubt stirred my interest in history at an early age.

It may also explain why I hope to see Marmora pay respect to its wonderful heritage by including many family histories of the original settlers in public archives.

We saw less of the McKinnon side of the family -- my grandfather, Killian, was the only one who remained in Marmora. The rest moved to northern Ontario where they, for a variety of reasons, became a little more financially secure.

It is difficult to imagine today that we would not have travelled to visit these folks. With seven children, a farm, and very limited funds, my parents stayed home and were grateful we were all healthy.

At a young age, we learned many of Dad's relatives were extremists. They either spent some of their time spouting the evils of "spirits", smoking and not attending church, OR they discreetly "brought along" a little extra for their coffee, and some of them even dared to criticize the religious rules we adhered to at that time.

During all this we had the time of our lives eavesdropping, while Mom graciously served coffee and goodies and always refused to have her coffee "flavoured".

History repeats itself. Now I am receiving visits from relatives I never had met.

One who appeared a couple of years ago, and returned last week, was Daniel Laughlin McKinnon, of Sudbury. That is a whole story unto itself.

Another visitor has been Mary Ellen Murray. She is doing a family tree.

To date she has provided the following information:

Our great great grandfather, John Murray, emigrated from County Mydoo, Longford, Ireland to Troy, New York in 1832. In 1841 he moved to this area. He died in 1864 and is buried in the Catholic cemetery north of Marmora.

His son, John Murray, married Mary O'Brien and they had 13 children. These included: Mary Ellen's grandfather Martin, my grandmother, Bridget McKinnon, Bernadette Shannon's mother, Justin McGee, the late Ed O'Connor's first wife, Agnes, the late Joe Murray's father, John, Jim Hughes' grandmother Catherine Hughes.

The others were: Dr. Joseph Murray's father, two nuns -- Mother Phillip and Sister Dominic (Hotel Dieu, Kingston), Minnie McDonnell, Mary Murray, James and Felix Murray.

Curiosity has been aroused. We await further reports from Mary Ellen who is to visit Catherine Murray (who has done in-depth ancestry research).

Mary Ellen's grandfather, Martin Murray, is buried in the Catholic Cemetery, Wolseley, but his wife, Margaret McCallum, is buried in Sacred Heart Cemetery, in Marmora.

## Daniel Laughlin McKinnon

A frequent visitor to the Marmora and Madoc area over the past few years, Daniel Laughlin (D.L.) McKinnon passed away at Etobicoke General Hospital, in Rexdale, on November 23, 1994.

Born in Sudbury July 15, 1916, he was the son of Cleve McKinnon and Pearl (Croteau). D.L. obtained his schooling in Sudbury and at St. Michael's College, in Toronto.

## OBITUARY

R. J. McKINNON

Death came suddenly shortly before noon, Jan. 12th, 1934, to Robert Joseph McKinnon, 72, as a result of heart failure as he was preparing to drive away from the Canadian National Railway station. He was found by C. A. Eby, Canadian National agent, as he was breathing his last. Although in indifferent health for some time, Mr. McKinnon had been carrying on as usual with his cartage business. He is survived by his wife, formerly Eva Kirkwood, whom he married in Belleville in 1893, two sons, Alex and Donald, and a daughter, Miss Viola, all popular Sudbury residents, two sisters, Mrs. T. M. Kirkwood, of Cartierville, Que., and Mrs. Robert Kirkwood, of Sudbury, and two brothers, Alex McKinnon, of Sault Ste. Marie, and Killian McKinnon, of Madoc.

The deceased was born in Deloro, Ont., in May, 1861, son of James Donald McKinnon and Catharine McCallum. He spent his early life there and as a young man went to Michigan. He came from there to the Sudbury district and worked as a timber cruiser and foreman in a lumber camp. Then he proceeded to the Columbia River district in British Columbia. Returning east, he managed the Algoma Park Hotel in Sault Ste. Marie for three years and came back to Sudbury, where he was in the contracting business for several years. He conducted a liquor store in Sudbury for three years and in 1903 became a brewers' agent, continuing in this line until 1907 when he became connected with D. L. McKinnon & Sons. He continued with this firm until 1929 and then established his cartage business.

Of a quiet and unassuming character, Mr. McKinnon nevertheless took a keen interest in current events and was faithful in the performance of his duties as a citizen. He was generous and kindly in thought and deed and is remembered by his friends as a sincere exponent of the highest standards in which he believed. As a young man he was much interested in sport, his particular hobby being trotting horses. At one time he owned several fine racers and was himself a skilful driver.

The funeral was held on Monday, Jan. 15th, from his late residence at 364 John street to St. Joseph's Church. Interment took place in the Roman Catholic cemetery.

# Long-lost relative visits Marmora

When we are young we are not necessarily curious about our roots, where our forefathers came from, or where our relatives are living or lived.

about those we had not met. Our maiden Aunt Clara did see that we were informed from time to time, and as the eldest in our family I was chosen to write letters to my cousins occasionally.

When cousin Davis Killian McKinnon and his charming wife, Anita, arrived last week, we instantly felt a warm kinship and felt very much "at home" with each other. I even found myself studying this likeable, fun gentleman and could identify his looks and mannerisms as being much like those of our late Aunt Mary (whom he had never met).

An afternoon was spent showing Davis where his father was raised (second house on the right on the Deloro road off Highway 7), the former Separate School he attended in Deloro, the maternal relatives' (Murrays) home north of Deloro, and finally the Sacred Heart graveyard where forefathers are buried: James McKinnon, great grandfather who came to Prince Edward Island from Scotland, on to Belleville and finally to Marmora; Killian McKinnon, grandfather, and two of his brothers, Davis's Uncle Frank and Aunt Clara McKinnon, plus many other relatives including the Murray clan.

It was an emotional but satisfying trip for Davis and Anita. They also toured the Sacred Heart of Jesus Church and said, in all of their travels, they have not encountered a prettier parish church.

I have spent this week getting my pictures in order and labelling them -- it will be appreciated in future years, I am certain!

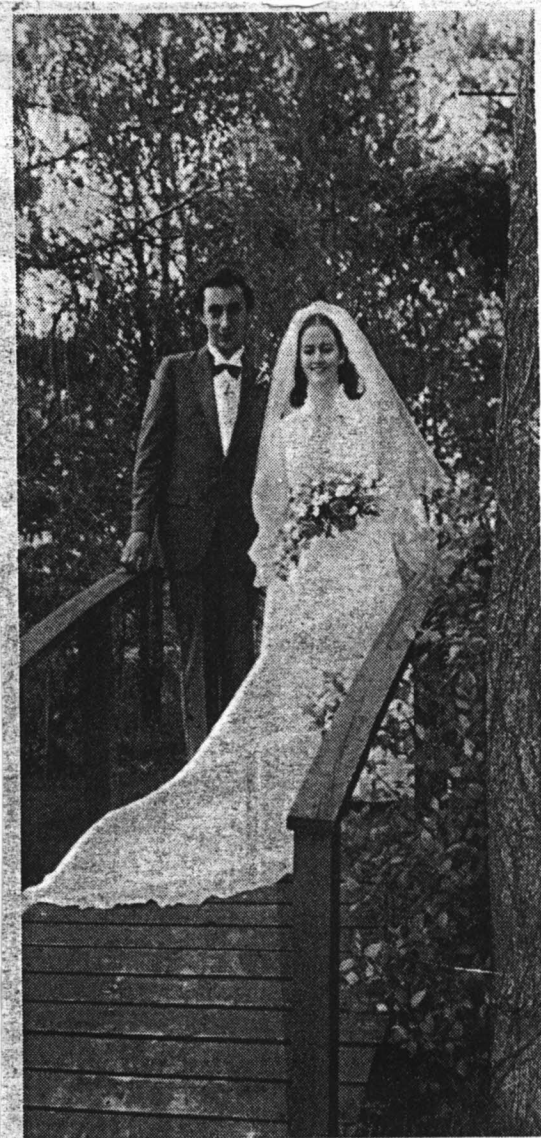

A former well-known resident of Marmora township passed away at his home in Sudbury on Friday, Sept. 21st, in the person of Daniel Laughlin McKinnon.
