The Late- Mr. T. S. Agar

Two weeks ago, an old, honored and loved citizen was removed from our midst. At one time, few men were better known to the people of a large part of the County of Hastings than Mr. Agar. For some years before his decease, owing to the _____ of age, and to ailments from which he had suffered many years, he was unable to travel much or to take part in public affairs, and had become a stranger to the people of much of the County. In Madoc, everyone knew him and by everyone he was respected. At least, fifty-five years of his life were spent in Hastings. During that time, as a public official and as a man of business, he was brought into contact with many. When we say that he has not left an enemy behind him, we only give voice to the opinion of all who knew him well. Naturally of a kind and amiable disposition, he was, in manner and speech, remarkable for his courtesy and urbanity. In these qualities, he was an admirable example of a class of which there are now left few specimens.

The son of a lieutenant in the British army, he was born, in 1808, at Maidstone, Kent, England. His early life was spent in the company of officers and, to this circumstance, may, we have no doubt, be attributed much that was characteristic in him—polished manners, a keen sense of honor and a loyalty to Queen, country and friends that old age never weakened.

After receiving a good education in a school in his native borough, he was indentured to a Mr. Fitch, an Attorney of some fame in London. While in his office, he came into contact with a number of famous men such as Lord Brougham and others. Office life and legal lore did not, however, have many attractions for him and, after completing the term for which he was articed, he determined to become a Canadian settler. This resolution he carried into effect in 1834, in which year he first saw the county in which he afterwards spent so many years of his life.

Employed, at first, for a short time, as laborer, he then taught school, at Canniff's Mills (now Canifton), for two years, at the termination of which he visited England. – Returning to Canada, with the wife who now mourns his loss, he. Resumed teaching, at Cannifton.

Subsequently, he taught in Sidney, Trenton and Stirling. By his former pupils, among whom were the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, Ketchan Graham, ex-M.P.P and other well known residents of the County, he was much esteemed.

In 1855, he removed to Huntingdon, to the farm now owned and occupied by Mr. Pitts. In 1863, on the death of Mr. George Mowat, he was appointed Superintendent of Schools for North Hastings or, rather, for all the county except Sidney, Thurlow and Tyendinaga. In this position, he continued until 1873, when he resigned. As School Inspector, he won the respect and affection of teachers and pupils. To the last, he took a keen interest in everything relating to schools.

After his resignation, he lived in Madoc almost continuously, known and esteemed by old and young. His widow, four daughters and a large number of grand-children and great-grand children are left to lament his decease and, with a multitude of friends, to honor his memory. For the last ten or twelve years of his life, he was a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church, and, for some years, one of its Session.

A kind and loyal friend, a good citizen and a Christian gentleman has entered into his rest. May all who speak his praise, imitate his Christian character !

GEORGE BRUCE AIRHART, FORMER REEVE *

After an extended period of ill health George Bruce Airhart passed away at his home in Belleville early Monday morning; After a very active and successful business career, he suffered a heart attack about five years ago and he had suffered from ill health ever since. Early last week his condition became critical and the end came Monday morning.

Bruce Airhart, as he was known all over Hastings county, was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Airhart and was born in Marmora township sixty-four years ago.

As a young man he came to Marmora and accepted a position with The Pearce Lumber Co. Limited. A few years after entering the employ of the company, he took a contract to bring down the company's drive of logs and demonstrated his ability to secure the loyal co-operation of his employees and had a very successful drive. Two years later he again took the contract with even greater success.

A year or two later he decided to start his own lumber business. He made a success of it from the start, the business expanding from year to year. Mr. Airhart always gave a good deal of credit for his success, especially, during the early years to two men. One was the late James L. Hickey, a woods ranger of wide, experience and knowledge, who backed him in the early stages of his venture, and gave much valuable advice on buying of limits et.

The other was Mr. John Davidson, who was selected as woods boss and foreman and has continued at that position all down through the years. From the first Mr. Airhart proved himself a keen business man, one who quickly made friends and won the esteem and confidence of those he had dealings with. He always had the respect and good-will of his employees.

In spite of the extent of his business interests and the time he devoted to them, the late Bruce Airhart gave generously of his time and ability to the municipality and to church. He was elected a member of Marmora Village Council about 1918 and on May 16th, 1920, was elected Reeve of Marmora following the death of the Reeve, the late R. J. Gray. He served as Reeve for nearly ten years, retiring at the end of the year 1929. In 1926 he was elected Warden of the County and was one of the most, popular officials to fill that position. Later, he served as a member of the High School Board for a couple of years.

The late Mr. Airhart was for nearly all the time of his residence in Marmora one of the most active members of St. Andrew's United Church. He was superintendent of the Sunday School for several years and a member of the Session and Board of Stewards.

His services were of great value in carrying on the work of the church and his generosity made it much, easier to meet any financial problems.

Fraternally he was a member, and Past Master of Marmora Lodge A.F. & A.:M., No 222. He was also a member of Springbrook I.O.O.F Lodge. For years he was a valued member of West Hastings and Hastings Peterboro Conservative Associations.

Few citizens of Marmora have had as wide a circle of friends as Mr. Airhart. Kindly and considerate with all, he had the art of winning lasting friendship to an unusual degree, He was always sympathetic to those in trouble, and generous any deserving cause.

Mr. Airhart is survived, by his wife formerly Annie Deacon, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Walter Deacon; one son Douglas D. and two daughters, Mrs W. E. McBride (Olive) and Mrs. J. E. Dickens (Illadell), all of Belleville.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon and was under the auspices of Marmora Masonic Lodge. The funeral service was conducted in Bridge street United Church, Belleville, by the pastor Rev. Donald. C. Amos, assisted by Rev C W Hollingsworth of Odessa. Both ministers Paid a very warm tribute to the late Mr. Airhart, as a fine Christian gentleman, keenly interested in the welfare of the Church. Mr. Bankior sang

"The Old Rugged. Cross" as a solo.

Early this morning the body of David Austin, a well-known resident of Rawdon, was found in a ditch at the north side of the village, about opposite Dr. Parker's barn. It appears that he left the village between 7 and 8 o'clock last night, and soon after turning north on the Marmora road his team, started to run away, and he was thrown out as above stated. By appearances his head struck a stone, which may have caused almost instant death, or at least so stunned him that he was unable to move, and he must have suffocated as he was found face down in the mud and water.

A number of villagers were soon on the scene, and the body was removed to Mr. Jas. Ralph's undertaking establishment. The team was found near Mr. Fanning's, some two or three miles north of the village, soon after, but his dead body was not found till this morning.
