One fact is this, that the good deeds, in other words the life of Jesse Barlow in our community, has been a blessing to us, and his name will be honored where spoken. Can any one among us deserve a more honored name or a better record? How many of us, his old friends, knowing his record, are arranging our every day life so as to receive as worthy and deserving eulogy when we relinquish our labors, our cares, and say the farewell ?
