The cause of the accident or what happened will probably never be known. Saunders states that he was asleep and does not know just what happened. The truck left the road and rolled over in the ditch. Cole was still living when help arrived and he was rushed to St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough, where he died about five hours later.

Oscar Cole was born in Sherbrooke, Quebec, the son of Frank Cole and the late Mrs. Cole, and was in his 24th year. He had lived in Marmora or District for the past 21 years.

He is survived by his wife, the former Madeline Adams and two sons, Frank and Robert Leonard. Also surviving him is his father and a grandmother, Mrs. Agnes McCallum.

The deceased engaged in trucking. He was a member of the Free Methodist Church and of Springbrook L.O.L.

DR. A. HAMILTON CRAWFORD

Early Tuesday morning, September 11th, Dr. A. Hamilton Crawford passed away at Mrs. E. Lawlor's nursing home. For thirty-five years he carried on a medical practice in Marmora and during that time he was company doctor for Deloro Smelting & Refining Company Limited. He was one of the district's best loved and most highly-esteemed citizens.

Dr. Crawford came to Marmora in the latter part of 1912 from Havelock, taking over the practice of the late Dr. W. G. Mackechnie and from the first was popular with the people of the community. Before coming to Marmora Dr. Crawford took post graduate work in England, earning several degrees and attaining a high standing in his profession. He practiced in Havelock for a few years before coming to Marmora.

While in Havelock he was married on May 25, 1911, to Helen Hay, R. N., daughter of Mrs. Thomas Hay and the late Mr. Hay, of Peterborough. She predeceased him on May 20th, 1919, leaving two young daughters and a son about 10 months old.

For many years Hamilton Crawford lived up to the highest standards of a small town doctor. Not only was he clever and competent physician, but to many families he became a counsellor and friend to whom they went with many of their troubles.

When he retired at the end of April, 1947 and decided to move to Brighton many felt a personal loss.

On Monday evening, April 29th, quite a number of citizens gathered at his home to express their regrets over his decision to leave Marmora and to express best wishes for his future.

Rev. H. J., Farrell acted as spokesman for the gathering and paid tribute to Dr. Crawford, both as citizen and a physician. Reeve R. E. Neal acted as chairman and Rev. J. M. Brownlie also expressed his high opinion of Dr. Crawford. Thos. R. Warren, on behalf of the citizens of Marmora, presented him with a fine diamond ring, and Mrs. Crawford with a beautiful Royal Doulton figurine.

The following day members of the staff and employees of Deloro S. & R. Co. Ltd. gathered en masse to do honor to the plant doctor for thirty-five years. Col. A. V. Yates, general manager, spoke warmly of the fine relationship which had existed between the company and its employees and Dr. Crawford. William Forestell, chairman of the Employees Committee, made a presentation of a beautiful gold watch suitably engraved and a very handsome brooch as a gift to Mrs. Crawford.

On October 15, 1948, one of the outstanding events in the history of Marmora took place, when the Dr. Hamilton Crawford Arena was officially opened. About 2000 were in attendance and the Reeves of the municipalities in the district, the local members of the Provincial and Federal parliament, the clergy and others united in praising the fine arena and paying tribute to Dr. Crawford whose honor it had been named. Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Ltd. have given a very generous contribution towards the cost of the arena provided it would be named "the Dr. Hamilton Crawford Arena". as a token of appreciation of the services of Dr. Crawford as plant doctor for so many years. All the family of Dr. Crawford were in attendance and Dr. Crawford was given a great ovation. The arena was officially opened by Miss Grace Crawford, R. N., of Albany N. Y.

A few years after coming to Marmora Dr. Crawford was married a second time, his bride being Mrs. Mary DeNike, whose maiden name was Mary McGlennon. She predeceased him June 16th, 1950, interment taking place at Lakeport cemetery, Colborne.
