HARRY ROSS HAACKE

The tragic death of Harry R. Haacke at his summer home at Crowe Lake early Friday morning, September 1st, came as a shock to the whole community. He had been in failing health for about four years and his condition had caused a state of melancholy which he was unable to overcome and his sudden death was the result.

Harry Haacke was born in Toronto, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Haacke. He was 57 years of age. His early life was spent in or near that city and in 1915 he enlisted for service in the First World War. He served overseas as a sergeant in the Army Service Corp.

About 1922 he came to Deloro to assume the management of The Deloro Trading Company Limited store and conducted the business for twenty-five years with marked success. His genial and kindly manner made him many friends throughout the community, who will regret his untimely demise.

He took a keen interest in community affairs and for a number of years served as a member of Deloro Public School Board. He was also a director of Marmora Agricultural Society for some years. The late Harry Haacke was for many years a valued member and elder of St. Andrew's United Church. His loyalty to the church and minister, his generous support of its various undertakings and his services as a member of the session were much appreciated. He had been a member of Marmora Lodge AF. & A.M. since 1924. About three years ago he was granted a year's of absence by the Directors of The Deloro Trading Co. Ltd. owing to ill health, but as his condition failed to improve he retired at the end of the year. In 1948 he and Mrs. Haacke purchased a house in Havelock, where they had since resided with the exception of the summer months, which they spent at their home at Crowe Lake.

The late Mr. Haacke is survived by his wife, formerly Anna Fidler; one daughter, Mrs. William Kerr (Dorothy), of Toronto; and two sons, Harry R., of Norwood, and Ewart, of Toronto; also ten grandchildren. He is survived, also, by one brother, George Haacke, of Toronto, and three sisters, Mrs. A. Brown and Mrs. Martha Craig; both of Toronto, and Mrs. Gladys Percival, of Kenmore, N. Y.

A short funeral service was conducted at the summer home at Crowe Lake on Sunday afternoon by Rev. Geo. D. Young, B.A., B.D., after which the remains were conveyed to the Funeral Chapel of McDougall & Brown, Danforth Ave., Toronto. A funeral service was conducted at the Chapel by Rev. Geo. Young, with prayer by Rev. Dr. Fletcher, of Oshawa, a former minister of St. Andrew's. The Masonic funeral service was conducted by Wor. Bro. C. R. Whittemore, W.M. of Marmora Lodge, assisted by Wor. Bros. H. C. Barlow and A. W. Drew and Rural Dean J. M. Brownlie, J.D. of Marmora Lodge. Several other members of Marmora Lodge also attended together with a number from Toronto and other places. Interment took place in Pine Hill Cemetery, Toronto, on Tuesday morning.

MRS. JOHN HAGGERTY *

In failing health for the past 10 years, Mrs. John Haggerty of Whitby died at Fairview Lodge Monday, April 20th. She was in her 84th year. Born at Marmora she was the former Ellen Leonard and was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Richard Leonard and had lived at Stirling before moving to Whitby 10 years ago. She was a member of the Anglican Church. Predeceased by her husband, John Thomas Haggerty in 1943, she is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Vern (Edna) Harris, Mrs. William (Helen) Thorndyke, Mrs. Max (Clara) Rich and Mrs. Florence Gudgeon, all of Whitby; one son William Haggerty of Brooklin, and seven grandchildren. She was the last of her family.

HAMILTONS * LETTER TO EDITOR

Dear Sirs:

I noted with great interest your August 3rd story relating to the small cemetery located at Fidler's Glen (Lot 16, Cone. 6 of Marmora Township) and the subsequent follow-up several weeks later. I can provide further information on several of the inscriptions mentioned and thought it might be of interest to your readers.

MARGARET ANN, wife of **WILLIAM T. HAMILTON**, was in fact Margaret Ann Morrow of Amherst Island, the daughter of Samuel and Isabelle Morrow. She was a young school teacher who had married William Thomas Hamilton of Halloway, Sidney Township, the son of Robert Hamilton and Hannah Young, on August 25, 1864, and then moved to Marmora Township.

She gave birth to my grandmother, Hannah Isabella Hamilton (who married William Carman) on June 13, 1865 and then, sadly, died on June 20, 1865, at age 21 years and 22 days.

William Thomas Hamilton subsequently married **ELIZABETH CARMAN** (the daughter of John Carman and Mary Jane Townsend), raised an additional family and resided in North Marmora until his death on June 8, 1909. He was the direct ancestor of most of the Hamiltons residing in the Marmora area to day.

JAMES AND SARAH HAMILTON

The tombstones of James (died March 7, 1881) and Sarah (died August 1, 1868) Hamilton are those of early Marmora settlers as attested to by the baptismal records of St. Thomas Anglican Church in Belleville, which describe James and Sarah as Marmora residents upon the births of their son, Steven Hamilton on May 20, 1838 and John Hamilton on March 5, 1839.

JAMES W. HAMILTON

The James W. Hamilton, who died on May 21, 1873 at age 38 years and 11 days, was their son. As an aside, I visited the gravesites several weeks ago and was very pleased by the excellent clearing job done by the two young volunteers, Jeff Bedore and Jordan Lloyd of the Marmora Historical Foundation.

A lifetime resident of Cordova Mines, Ont., died Friday June 26th in the Civic Hospital, Peterborough. His death came very suddenly as a result of an accident while herding cattle. He was rushed by ambulance to the hospital but passed away a few hours later.

Mr. Hamilton was a son of the late Thomas Hamilton and his wife the former Elizabeth Caravan. Over fifty years ago he was married to Bertha Moffatt and to the union were born two sons and one daughter, Carman, of Cordova Mines, Arthur of Peterborough, and Ella (Mrs. J. Edwards) also of Cordova Mines.

He leaves to mourn his loss his wife and family, thirteen grandchildren and twenty great grandchildren.

The deceased had been an ardent worker in the Free Methodist Church for the last forty-four years. He was of a friendly disposition and a good neighbour and the large gathering at his funeral was a manifestation of the high esteem in which he was held.

WILLIAM HAMILTON *

Son Helpless To Save Father, 73 Cow Drags Farmer To Death

Carman Hamilton, 49, watched helplessly as his 73-year-old father was dragged to his death by an enraged cow on a Cordova Mines farm Friday. William Hamilton, of Cordova Mines, died in Civic Hospital at 1:30 p.m. He had severe head injuries and multiple lacerations and bruises to the whole of his body. He was admitted to the hospital in a coma and never regained consciousness.

The accident happened on a farm owned by Harry Edwards, two-and-a-half miles west of William Hamilton's property.

SR. PASTURE The cow, a two-year-old holstein, had been let out to pasture on the Edwards farm. It was in calf and Mr. Hamilton and his son had taken a truck to return it to the Hamilton farm. They were accompanied by 35-year-old Claude McCarthy, of Cordova Mines. Carman Hamilton gave this description of what happened:

"My father put a rope around the cow's neck. He stepped back and seemed to get it tangled around his feet. The cow got mad and took off across the field.

DRAGGED 200 YARDS "It ran for about 200 yards, dragging my father. I ran right after it. It was only seconds before I got the rope off dad. The cow had stopped on a rise in the ground. My father was very badly injured. I stayed with him. McCarthy went to call Howden's ambulance in Marmora. The two-year-old cow has not yet calved.

FUNERAL SUNDAY

Punkfest founder had heart of gold, friends say

Belleville - Warren William (Spider) Hastings could be "kind of intimidating," admits his niece, Robin E. Jenkins. He was, after all, a six-foot-five punk rocker, with multi-coloured hair, body piercings and tattoos and he wore T-shirts with messages that would make a sailor blush.

But, as many testified last Saturday, beneath that unorthodox exterior beat a heart of gold.

About 250 people filled the John R. Bush Funeral Home in Belleville to say goodbye to the man everyone simply called Spider. The Marmora-area resident died Feb. 15 at his beloved Spiderland Acres from health related issues. He was 72.

"I spent three-and-a-half years with him," Jay Young, 26, said just prior to the 1 p.m. service. "He took me in when I was a kid. He turned my life around."

On the streets, not yet 16 and battling an addiction to alcohol, Young met Spider who took him to Spiderland. "He took me in to visit his place and told me, you know, Just to stay for a week," Young said. "He ended up putting me back in high school."

Spider also got Young into a career. The former cook at CFB Trenton taught Young culinary skills. Today, Young lives in Lanark, near Ottawa, where he is a chef and he plans to open his own restaurant.

Many of the young people Spider met were visitors to his annual Punkfest, held each year on the weekend closest to his birthday, July 13. At first in the late 1990s, Marmora residents liked Punkfest because it attracted money, said Jenkins, a Baltimore, Md. resident who had returned for the funeral of her uncle. Spider had no children.

"I used to come up for Punkfest a lot," the former Marine said. "At first, they (Marmora residents) enjoyed having people there because they were bringing in revenue."

But sometimes there would be more people arriving to party than there were residents and people began to get nervous.

One year, an injunction was procured and Punkfest had to move to Marlbank. But as residents battled Punkfest and succeeded in limiting parties to 50 guests, or else a permit was required, Robin said, some of the stuffing went out of Punkfest. But it never died, Young said, whether there were five or 500 at Spiderland. "You couldn't stop Punkfest," he said. "It was his birthday." Robin's siblings, Sherman A. Jenkins Jr. of Bowling Green, Ohio, Rochelle E. Jenkins and Warren William Jenkins, both of Lockport, N.Y., were also at the funeral.

"My uncle would take them (young people) in, give them a place to stay (until they could) kind of get their lives back in order," Sherman said. "He would never turn anyone down. He saved a lot of good lives."

A one-time crony of the infamous English punk band The Sex Pistols, Spider was also a Woolworth's store manager. He got the nickname Spider when he was a stockboy in an A & P store in Toronto. A lady dropped a bunch of groceries because she thought a spider was on her, and he began to pick up the foodstuffs. 'Someone said he looked like a spider and the name stuck
