During the ministry of Rev. E. M. Cadigan, with the assistance of a couple of other ladies Mrs. Litt organized a junior choir which won a splendid reputation Mrs. Litt was one who made and retained many friends. Kindly and always ready to use her musical talent for the benefit of the community, she was held in high esteem.

Recovery followed to the extent that he was able to resume his business pursuits, but he was never really well afterwards.

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Valentine Litt and was born at Sebringville, Ont., near Stratford. His parents came to Canada from Alsace-Lorraine and his mother lived until nearly 101 years of age, passing away suddenly just a week before her 101st birthday. Of a family of ten children only two daughters now survive .

The late W. H. Litt came to Marmora from Teeswater in 1911, when he purchased the mercantile and undertaking business of the late B. C. Hubbell, which was carried on in the store now occupied by F. N. Marett and Co. Disposing of the business after a short time he secured other employment in the village for a few years and then for quite a number of years had been a travelling sales man for a Toronto firm.

The deceased was quiet and reserved, taking little active part in public affairs, but he was a keen student of both national and international politics and was an interesting conversationalist. He was a staunch Liberal in politics and a member of the United Church and was highly esteemed by all who knew him well. He was an expert horseman and found considerable pleasure in training and driving race horses. On a number of occasions he drove race horses at Marmora Fair.

The late W. H. Litt is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Flora James, of Gorrie, and two daughters, Mrs. Wm. Regan, of Deloro, and Mrs. H. Rennie, of Marmora. Also two sisters, Mrs. Anna Kruspe, of Stratford and Mrs. Wm. Yaeger, of Waterloo.
