Branch 237, Royal Canadian Legion, was Past Noble Grand of IOOF Springbrook Lodge 429, and was District Deputy Grand Warden of IOOF Springbrook Lodge 429 at the time of his death. From 1964 to 1968, Mr. Airhart served with the Marmora Public School Board.

He was elected to Marmora Village Council in December. 1968, where he served as councillor for four years. In December 1972, he was elected Deputy-reeve, the first in Marmora Village, where he served for four years. He began serving in 1973 at the County Council level of government. . He was elected Reeve of Marmora Village on December 6, 1976, and reelected in 1978. He also received The office of Reeve twice by acclamation in 1980 and 1982. He was completing his ninth year in that office at the time of his death. He was also a past member of Marmora Volunteer Fire Department.

The funeral service was held on Monday. May 6, at St. Andrew's United Church with the Reverend Walter Mittler officiating. A special service was held at the McConnell. After an extended illness following a paralytic stroke, Oliver Airhart passed away at his home in the Village Wednesday morning. He was born in Sidney Township on July 8th, 1852, and moved with his parents to Marmora when about eight years of age. His father was the late Adam Airhart, and his mother's maiden name was Hannah Rosebush; They were pioneers of Marmora and Lake and cleared the land and opened up what was known as the Airhart Settlement just over the boundary in Lake township.

About 55 years ago the late Oliver Airhart was married to Margaret Jane McIlwaine, who predeceased him in 1907. Four sons were born to them as follows: George Bruce, of Marmora; Frank, of Morse, Sask.; Stewart, who was killed by lightning about twelve years ago; and Charles, of Marmora. In 1909 he was married to Mrs. Jane Wells, widow of the late Henry Wells and daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Bonter, who survives him.

The deceased engaged in farming in Marmora township nearly all his life. He was very widely known and had an unusual number of warm friends. His integrity and high Christian standard of living won the esteem and respect of all who knew, him and his friendliness, kindly sympathy, and interest in the welfare of others made him very dear to a large circle of friends.

For a number of years he was a member of Marmora and Lake Council and gave very efficient service. He was a member of the Methodist Church for many years and after the church which he attended in the township was closed, he joined the Free Methodist church. About four years ago he purchased the Froats property on Madoc Street and moved to the village.

STEWART AIRHART *

The electrical storm last Thursday resulted in a sad tragedy, when Stewart Airhart was instantly killed by lightning. He was drawing in hay and had just finished unloading and was standing talking to Fred Vincent, who was in the mow, when the bolt struck him killing him instantly. The result of the shock was so great that he was hurled from the wagon into the mow. Vincent was also slightly shocked, but he ran to the door and called the deceased's brother, Charles Airhart, who was with another team nearby. Together they just succeeded in getting the body out of the barn when the building was enveloped in flames. The fire spread so rapidly that the barn, pig pen and house were totally destroyed with most of the contents.

The deceased was 32 years of age and was a son of Mr. Oliver Airhart. He leaves a wife and one child. He is also survived by three brothers, Frank, of Alsace, Sask., Bruce, the popular Reeve of Marmora Village, and Charles, at home. The late Stewart Airhart was popular with a huge number of friends and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved relatives. The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon and was one of the largest held here in recent years. Service was conducted in Marmora Methodist church by Rev. Mr. Brown, of Picton. after which the remains were interred in Marmora cemetery by the side of his mother, who passed away in 1907.

Two Brothers Killed
ALVIN AND BENJAMIN ARCHIBELL *
Dead as Result of Auto Crash

The worst automobile accident in the history of this district occurred on Tuesday evening on the Stirling Road opposite lot 12 in the 13th concession of Rawdon, when Benjamin Archibell was instantly killed and his brother Alvin was so badly injured that he died a few hours later in Belleville Hospital. A wrist watch, which the former was wearing, stopped at 9.04, which was the time the accident occurred.

Constable Gillen has carried a warrant for the arrest of Benjamin Archibell for a week or two. The warrant was for a charge of assault laid by Mr. Baker, who lives west of the Village. Constable Gillen and County Constable Lavender noticed the accused drive onto Forsythe street with his brother. They immediately secured a car and started in pursuit. After driving around a couple of streets Archibell started south on the Stirling road with the constables following. They overtook him just south of Mr. Jas. McInroy's and both cars almost came to a stop. Mr. Gillen started to get out of the car, but slipped and almost fell. Just then Ben Archibell, who was driving, apparently saw who it was and started his car so quickly that it left the road and almost ran into the fence on the West side of the road.

It is a wonder an accident did not occur then, but the car swung back on to the road and started south at a very high speed. The constables followed, but soon dropped far behind. South of the home of Mr. John Brown, Sr., the fleeing car met a load of hay driven by Geo. Wellman, Jr. The load was well to the side of the road, but the car turned out too far and left the road. While the road is wide and in almost perfect condition at that point a number of large stones had been placed in the ditch. The end of a galvanized culvert also extended into the ditch. When the brakes were applied the car slid for some distance, but the speed was so great the driver apparently lost control. The car raced over the stones and culvert and then crashed sideways into a tree. Every wheel was smashed and the chassis, body and top damaged beyond repair.

Apparently the driver was hurled head first against the tree, causing a hemorrhage of both ears, both nostrils and the mouth, and killing him instantly. His brother Alvin also appeared to have been thrown against the tree, his head being crushed. Both were thrown through the door of the car the latter lying with his feet in the car and his body on the ground.

Coroner Dr. Harper, of Madoc, was immediately notified and was soon over. Alvin, who was still living, was rushed to Belleville hospital where he died about 1.30 a.m. Benjamin's body was brought to the village and placed in the Council Chamber.

Yesterday morning a jury was empanelled composed of the following: Geo. Wellman, Philip Sopha, Chas. Lummiss, Thos. Potts, David Mc-Garvey, Jesse Barlow, T. J. Byrnes and H. W. Sabine. On motion of Messrs. Wellman and Barlow H. W. Sabine was elected foreman. After viewing the body of Benjamin Archibell the jury went down to look over the scene of the accident. The inquest has been adjourned until next Wednesday, Aug. 28th at 2 p.m.

The deceased were sons of Mr and Mrs. Jacob Archibell. Alvin was 35 years of age. For some time he has been residing in Detroit, where he engaged in his trade as a carpenter. Previous to that he lived in Oshawa.

Benjamin was 26 years of age. He had resided in Marmora most of his life. Besides their parents they are survived by one sister, Mrs. Geo. Johnston, of Marmora Twp, and one brother, Ernest, of Trenton.

The funeral will leave their parents' residence at 9.45 on Friday, the 23rd inst. and proceed to Marmora United Church for service at 10.15 a.m.
