ALLAN BAILEY FATALLY INJURED *

Allan Thomas Bailey, aged 23 years, was fatally injured at the Armstrong Bros. Rock Quarry just south east of Marmora on Saturday morning, May 21st when a large truck rolled over on him. He was hacking a Euclid truck loaded with rock out onto a stock pile to dump when the edge of the pile gave away under the rear wheels and the truck dropped about fifty feet and rolled over. Mr. Bailey was either thrown out or jumped out and the big truck landed on top of him. He was given medical aid by Dr. McCarthy and Dr. Parkin and rushed by ambulance to the hospital but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Allan Bailey was born in Marmora Township, a son of Mr. Charles Bailey and the former Gladys Bonter. He was educated in Marmora District Schools and was a member of St. Andrew's United Church. He had been employed by the Armstrong Brothers Construction Co.

Besides his parents, he is survived by one sister, Miss Anna Bailey, and three brothers- Douglas, Robert and Charles, all at home. One sister, Mrs. D. Stocker (Betty) died in an automobile accident some years ago.

The funeral service was conducted in the Howden Funeral Home on Tuesday, May 21th, at 2.20 p.m. by Rev. James Dunlop, assisted by Rev. J. M.D. McLeod. Interment was in Marmora Protestant Cemetery. The pall bearers were Edward Shannon, James Hughes, Daniel Ireland, Douglas Carman, Victor Provost and Earl Moloney.

The late Mr. Bailey is survived by three sons, Hugh, of Peterborough, James Edgar, of Marmora Village and Charles, of Marmora township. He is also survived by one brother Joshua, of Belleville, and two sisters, Mrs. John Lough and Mrs John Bell, both of Marmora township.

The deceased took an active part in the erection of Holy Trinity Church in North Marmora about thirty-five years ago. He was a member of the township council for a number of years and also served as a school trustee. He was one of the oldest Orangemen in Hastings County and was also a member of the Masonic order. He was widely known and highly esteemed and was for many years one of the townships most progressive farmers.

JOSHUA BAILEY *

Quietly and peacefully, without any illness or suffering, Joshua Bailey passed away on Monday afternoon, while sitting talking to a friend in the rotunda of the Royal Hotel. He had reached the ripe old age of 88 years, having celebrated his birthday last Friday, and the end came as he had expressed the wish it might come on various occasions, "without any illness or trouble or worry to relatives and friends. Both Dr. R. E. Taft and Dr. H. Crawford were quickly summoned when the end came, and both pronounced him beyond human aid. Constable Percy Gray notified the Chief Coroner and Crown Attorney B. C. Donnan, K.C., as is necessary according to law in such cases, but after hearing the particulars it was decided an inquest was unnecessary.

The deceased was a son of the late James Bailey and wife, formerly Isabella Quinn, two of the early pioneers of Marmora township. Only two or three weeks ago the writer sat for an hour or more with Mr. Bailey (in the Council Chamber) as he related incidents of the early days in this district. Events of seventy-five or eighty years ago seemed more clear to him than those of recent date. He had known many people, some of them noted in days gone by, and his kindly sense of humor and friendliness had won for him many friends. As he told of conditions and hardships encountered in the early days one wondered what would be the reaction to such conditions today. Even during the depression few have suffered the privations, which were taken as a matter of course and borne cheerfully in those days.

The late Joshua Bailey was married to Charity Keller, of Huntingdon township who predeceased him quite a number of years ago. Eleven children were born to them of whom seven survive. They are Mrs. D. Carney, Toronto; Mrs. G. Tompkins, Belleville; Mrs. Richard Spry, Cordova; Mrs. Vann Orr, Glen Miller; Fred Bailey, Oshawa; James, Madoc township and Allan, present address unknown. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. John Bell and Mrs. John Lough, both of Marmora township. In recent years the late Mr. Bailey had made his home at Mr. George Wellman's, making extended visits to relatives and friends in other places throughout the year. He had just recently returned from a visit in Belleville.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon, under the auspices of Marmora Loyal Orange Lodge No. 319, of which the deceased was a member for many years. Leaving the residence of Mr. Wellman the funeral procession led by members of the Order, proceeded to St. Paul's church where service was conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell, who also performed the last rites of the Church at the graveside, after which the funeral ceremonies of the Orange Order were conducted.

JOHN FREDERICK BAKER

On Saturday, September 13th, John Frederick Baker passed away in Belleville General Hospital. For about five years he had suffered a heart condition which gradually grew worse and for a couple of years he had been confined to his home, or his bed, most of the time.

Jack Baker, as he was well known all over the district, was born in Tudor township, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Baker, and was in his 66th year. At an early age he became a railway employ and about forty-five years ago was moved to Central Ontario Junction, later named Bonarlaw.

The railway at that time was The Central; Ontario Railway. Later it was acquired by the Canadian Northern Railway, which was controlled and operated by the Mackenzie & Mann interests. Subsequently it was merged in the Canadian National System and the name of the Station was changed to Bonarlaw. The station was a junction point for the C.P.R. and the lines mentioned so that the agent acted for both railways.

In spite of changes in ownership, Mr. Baker continued in the same station. For most of the time he was station agent and he was esteemed and trusted by

his various employers and was very popular with the public with whom he had to deal. Kindly, courteous and efficient it was a pleasure to do business with him. Before the days of automobile, trucks and buses, the Central Ontario junction (now Bonarlaw) station was a very busy place with a local train to Toronto in the morning and returning in the evening, as well as the afternoon and night trains over the C. P. R. For many years Jack Baker took a very active interest in community affairs. He was a leader in St. Mark's church, holding various offices, and was superintendent of the Sunday School for quite a number of years and a member of the choir. He was always ready to help in anything which would benefit the church. He was a member of Marmora Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 222 since 1909 and was elected Worshipful Master for the years 1914 and 1918. He was also a member of Chapter R. A.M. Stirling. He was a charter member of Springbrook I.O.O.F. Lodge No. 429 and held a number of important offices in the lodge. He was also a member of the Public School Board of his section for a number of years. In spite of his busy life he found time to assist in many community gatherings. He was secretary-treasurer of Marmora Agricultural Society for three years until ill health forced him to retire.

The deceased was a gifted and popular tenor singer and was much in demand especially for church affairs throughout the district. For years he was a member of the quartet composed of W. A. Sanderson, W. L. Rigg, J. F. Baker and W. Lester which gained a very fine reputation for their splendid vocal selections.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Matilda Webb, and three sons, Cecil A. Baker, Chester J. Baker and Kennard A. Baker, all of Elmvale, Ont.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, proceeding from his late residence to St. Mark's Church, where service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Robertson, rector of Napanee Anglican Church, who also conducted the Committal service at the graveside in Marmora Protestant cemetery.
