WALTER DEACON *

At the ripe old age of eighty-eight years, Walter Deacon passed away at his home, McGill Street, Marmora, early yesterday morning. For some time he had gradually been growing weaker and death came as a result of advanced age.

He was born on June 29th, 1851, and had spent all his life in this community. He was a son of the late Mr and Mrs. Walter Deacon, who came to Hastings County from Devonshire, England, among the early pioneers of this part of Ontario.

As a young man the late Walter Deacon cadged for some of the big lumber companies and was also engaged as a teamster in their camps. Among the firms he worked for were the Page Company, the Gilmour Company, the Rathbun Company and later on the Pearce Company.

He was dependable and industrious and an expert with horses and as a result his services were always in demand. When the companies referred to were at the peak of their operations, lumbering was the leading industry in this part of the Province and hundreds of men were employed in the camps during the winter and at river driving during the spring and early summer. As a number of the big drives of logs came through Marmora it was a lively place at various times.

. The deceased was widely known among employees of the lumber camps, as well as early citizens of Marmora district. Friendly and with a keen sense of humor he was popular with a large circle of friends. During recent years he has been confined to his home, owing to advanced age, and most of his friends of earlier years have passed on before him.

His wife, whose maiden name was Mary Jane Christie, predeceased him on April 15th, 1933. He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. G. B. Airhart, of Belleville, and Mrs. Gordon Jarvis and Miss Violet, of, Marmora. Two daughters predeceased him, Minnie, in 1900, and Olive in 1919. The funeral will leave his late residence and proceed to St. Andrew's United Church for service at 2 o'clock to-morrow (Friday) afternoon. The funeral sermon will be preached by Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth, a former pastor, and the service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. W. P. Fletcher.

The late Thomas Henry Derry was a man of strong convictions, public spirited, a good neighbor and a staunch friend. He was a member of St. Paul's Anglican church for years and of Trinity church since it was opened. He was an ardent Orangeman, following the tradition of his grandfather, one of the original members of Marmora L-O.L. No. 319, who was known as Protestant John Derry. The deceased was one of the oldest members of Nickle L.O.L. No. 285, the hall being situated near Malone. While he was a devoted Anglican and Orangeman, Mr. Derry was tolerant and friendly to members of all other churches, provided they were honest and sincere. The deceased had suffered from a heart condition for some years and had been confined to his home some days or weeks at various times. Recently he had been able to be around and assist with the work and on Wednesday helped with the sawing of some wood and seemed none the worse for it, so that the end came with shocking suddenness.

The late William H. Derry was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Derry and was born at Malone. He has been a resident of the township all his life and was held in high esteem. Quiet and unassuming he was a good friend and neighbor, a man of unquestioned integrity and one ready to help in any good cause. On a number of occasions he was nominated for the municipal Council, but declined to accept office. For quite a number of years he was Rector's Warden for Trinity Anglican Church.

About thirty-five years ago the late Mr. Derry was married to Margaret Darrah, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Darrah, who survives him. About twenty-seven years ago they moved to the farm where he had since resided. The deceased was widely known and had been a familiar figure around the village as far back as the majority of our citizens can remember. He was of a friendly disposition.

BODIES RECOVERED FROM RIVER

MRS. CHARLES DUNLAY AND SON WILFRED

After over a week's search of the river the body of the late Mrs. Chas. Dunlay was found Sunday by Constable W. Lavender and others who were assisting in the search. The coroner was immediately notified and arrangements made for taking the remains to the Undertaking Rooms of F. N. Marett & Co.

The body was found near the south end of the Village at the rear of Chas. Cronkwright's residence. The back of the head had been badly injured, apparently by striking against the dam or the rocks below it. After viewing the remains and considering all the circumstances connected with the drowning accident, Coroner Dr. Beatty of Madoc decided an inquest was unnecessary and released the body for burial.

Interment took place in Marmora Protestant, cemetery on Monday, services at the graveside being conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell.

The body of the son, Wilfred, was found on Monday by Fish and Game Overseer, J. A. Shannon, floating near the west shore a short distance below the dam near the spot where the boat was first discovered. Capt. Ruston, head of the Children's Aid Society in Hastings County, was in Marmora and supervised arrangements for the funeral as Wilfred was a Ward of the Society. He was buried beside his mother the services also being conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell.

The drowning accident occurred sometime on Thursday afternoon or evening, May 20th.

Although the river had been searched as far south as the C.P.R. bridges and an almost constant watch kept up until Sunday, no trace could be found until the bodies came to the surface.

Considerable relief is felt that the search is at last over and the bodies properly interred.
