After several years of ill health Clarence W. Gladney passed away in Belleville General Hospital early Tuesday evening. He was taken to the Hospital on Sunday, but through the day Tuesday his condition seemed improved, but at the last he passed away suddenly.

Clarence W. Gladney was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Gladney, his father being a prominent and popular business man in the early days of the village. Clarence, who was in his 65th year, was a resident of the village for about 46 years, except for a time he was away at school

For a time before World War I he was in partnership with his brother, Edward M., carrying on a general merchandising business in the Gladney building on the northwest corner of Madoc and McGill street. Edward enlisted for service overseas and Clarence entered in partnership with Jack Gehan, now of Tweed, and Tim Byrnes, who passed away a few years ago. After a comparatively short time the partnership was dissolved and Clarence carried on alone for some years. His integrity and high business standards won him the respect and esteem of the whole community. In 1932 he disposed of the business and for several years carried on as a travelling salesman.

About 18 years ago he moved to Belleville, but continued to have an office in Marmora for his insurance business, which he carried on in conjunction with his work as a commercial traveller. He also spent his summers at his cottage at Crowe Lake, so that he didn't lose touch with his many Marmora friends.

Mr. Gladney was a valued member of St. Andrew's United Church and never severed his membership in the church here. During the summer he was a regular attendant and while health permitted drove up Sunday after Sunday. While resident here he served as a member of the Board of Stewards and also as an elder for a time. He was always ready to assisting any church activities while here, and his support was much appreciated by his fellow members. He was also a Past Master of Marmora Lodge A. F. & A. M. No. 222, making frequent visits even after leaving Marmora. Clarence was an enthusiastic supporter of Marmora hockey teams, and so helped promote other sports, although he was unable to take an active part, having badly injured his foot as a boy. In earlier years he was a great lacrosse fan, when ' Marmora was on the lacrosse map.

He was married to Jennie Cora Hickey, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hickey, and sister of Postmaster Warren Hickey. She passed away at a comparatively early age leaving two daughters, Jean and Elizabeth, who had lived with their father, who was devoted to them as they were to him. ## **MR. WILLIAM E. GLADNEY Prominent Marmora Citizen Dead. \***

The many readers of The Review throughout North Hastings will learn with deep regret of the death of Mr. William E. Gladney, which took place at Marmora on Monday last, 1st September. Mr. Gladney had for years past been one of the most prominent and respected residents of that flourishing village. As head of the firm of W. E. Gladney & Co., he had built up one of the most prosperous general store businesses in North Hastings, and to the great amount of energy and hard work he threw into his business may in a measure be ascribed his early demise. A year or so ago he had a slight attack of paralysis which obliged him to somewhat curtail his work, but for some time afterwards he still managed the large business of the firm. Of late, however, he had been obliged to give up all business worry, but despite this he gradually grew worse until the end came with a general breaking up of his whole system. Asthma of the heart was the immediate cause of death.

Notwithstanding his devotion to business, Mr. Gladney gave considerable of his time to the public service. He had filled the position of Reeve of the municipality of Marmora & Lake for many years, and was an active worker in all things that concerned the welfare of the community. He carried the same activity and enthusiasm into public affairs, and was considered a leader of the Conservative party in Marmora and vicinity, but always retained the respect and confidence of his opponents. He was a member of the Public School Board, chairman for many years, and a member at the time of his death, was also an active worker in the Methodist church. The funeral on Wednesday was under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity, of which craft he was an honored member.
