MAJOR PERCY GRAY *

Marmora lost one of her outstanding citizens yesterday morning in the passing of Major Percy Gray. Mr. Gray had been in poor health for two or three years and had been confined to the hospital on various occasions, but had been at his home for the past week or two. He was sitting up shaving himself when he suffered a heart seizure from which he failed to rally.

He was 60 years of age.

Major Gray was a veteran of both the First and Second World Wars. In the first War he enlisted as a boy in the 21st Battalion, and served overseas, attaining the rank of Sergeant.

When the second World War broke out he again offered his services to his country, and entered the Porvost Corps as a Lieutenant later being given the rank of Major in charge of the Corps At Ottawa.

Major Gray was born in Marmora, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Gray. With the exception of the War years he had spent nearly his whole life in Marmora. Following the First War he served as Village Con stable for a time and then joined the Ontario Provincial Police and was stationed in Marmora for some time and in Bancroft for three or four years. In 1934 he was let out of the Force in the reshuffle when the Hepburn Administration was in power and from then until the outbreak of the Second War he again served as Village Police and Caretaker of the Municipal Buildings.

Following World War 2 he was employed for a time by the Bascombe Lumber Co. at Renfrew and later carried the mail on Rural Route No.1 from Marmora for some years.

When the L. C. B.O. opened its store in Marmora he was employed there until failing health forced him to retire a short time ago.

Percy Gray was proud of his home town and never failed to serve it to the best of his ability. Whenever any project was started for the betterment of the community or its citizens he was one of the first to offer his services and he always stayed with the job until it was completed. He had been a member of the Canadian Legion since its inception and was the first president of the Local Branch. Prior to the start of the Canadian Legion B. E. S. L. he was a member of the G. W. V. A. and. He served both organizations faithfully. He was made a Life Member of the Canadian Legion about a year ago. In politics he was a Progressive Conservative. He was a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Mr. Gray was fond of children and always took an interest in their welfare. For a number of years he was a member of Marmora Public School Board. He organized a Boy Scout troop in Marmora in the early 1930's and acted as Scout Master for some years.

He was keenly interested in sports, particularly hockey, and had been on the executive of Marmora Hockey Club for many years. He was one of the most enthusiastic supporters in the building of Marmora's arena and the installation of artificial ice and devoted a great deal of time to the projects.

At the end of the First World War Mr. Gray was married to an English girl, Elsie Rundle, who came to Canada with him and who survives him. He also leaves to mourn his loss two daughters and two sons: Mrs. Roy (Gertrude) Abrams, Napanee; Robert, Marmora; Mrs. Hector (Jennie) Gould, Niagara Falls, Ont. and Albert at home, one. sister also survives, Mrs. Urban Shaw, (Lydia) Toronto.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN GREEN

Was Resident of Marmora Over forty-Five Years.

One of the most widely known citizens of Marmora passed away very suddenly last Saturday morning in the person of Mr. John Green. Deceased had not been in good health for some weeks, but was around as usual. He went to the doctor's office just before his death, but apparently had no symptoms of any very serious condition and returned home again. He was only in the yard a few minutes when he dropped down. His wife noticed him, but life was extinct before she reached him.

The late John Green, was born in Rawdon township in 1851. Over forty-five years ago he came to Marmora and he has been a resident of the village ever since. He started in the harness business, which he carried on successfully for about thirty years. Later he ran a summer hotel at Crowe Lake until a couple of years ago, when it was destroyed by fire.

For many years Mr. Green took an active interest in matters pertaining to the welfare of the village. He was a director of the Agricultural Society for several years and was president for a time. He was one of the boosters in any celebration to raise funds for local purposes. Deceased also acted as Tax collector for a number of years and made an efficient official.

Deceased was a member of Marmora L. O. L. No. 319 and one of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland. For many years he was one of the leading members of the Lodge. When the C.O.O.F. was organized in Marmora he was one of the first members and he still belonged to the Society at the time of his death.

Mr. Green and his wife were noted for their hospitality and their home was seldom without some visitors. The deceased will be missed by a wide circle of friends.

About fifteen years ago Mr. Green suffered a slight paralytic stroke which was followed within a comparatively brief period by two others. Although he apparently recovered physically, he was never quite the same afterwards and was more reserved and less cheerful.

The late Mr. Green is survived by a widow, formerly Miss Wilcox, one son, W. J., of Bloomfield, and one daughter, whose home is in North Dakota. He is also survived by three brothers and four sisters. They are George W. Green, of Gladstone, Mich.; Jerome C., of Cleveland, Ohio.; Joseph Q., of Trenton-, Ont.; Mrs. W. A. White, of Smithfield, Ont.; Mrs. Ira Sine, of Frankford, Ont.; Mrs. Joshua Richard son, of Frankford. Ont.; and Mrs. Darwin Desmon of Rochester.

The funeral was held yesterday afternoon and was under the auspices of the Orange and Black Knight Lodges. A large number of brethren were in attendance at the ceremony. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. H. Clarke, of Cavan, formerly of Marmora, assisted by Rev. W. P. Woodger, pastor of the Methodist church where the service was conducted. Mr. Clarke delivered an impressive and appropriate sermon. The remains were interred in Marmora cemetery, the burial service of the Orange Order being held at the graveside.
