ADAM McGARVEY

Death removed a well known and highly respected townsman on Tuesday, September 1st, in the person of Mr. Adam McGarvey. Deceased had been in poor health for the past five months. He passed peacefully to his eternal reward but a short while before the 65th anniversary of his birth. He was born in Sheffield Township, Lennox and Addington County in the year 1860 and Marmora has known him as a resident for the past twenty-eight years, He is survived by his widow, four sisters and a brother.

The latter are, Mrs. T. Legrow and Mrs. William Gray of Marmora. Mrs. Edward McGarvey of Toronto, Mrs. Annie Walters of Syracuse, N.Y., and Mr. Allen McGarvey of Marmora. Deceased was an Anglican in religion and a Conservative in politics.

He was also for many years a member of Marmora L.T.B. 177, under whose auspices the funeral took place on Friday afternoon, September 4th.

Members of Sulphide L.T.B. 322 arrived early to mingle with local sisters and brethren paying their last respects. The cortege proceeded to St. Paul's Church, where the service was taken by the Rector, Rev. P. Caiger-Watson. The hymns sung were "The Saints of God, Their Conflict Passed" and "Praise My Soul, the King of Heaven." The sermon was based up on Psalm. 90:12. After committal at the cemetery, the members of the True Blue Association formed as near approach to a circle as circumstances permitted and sang three verses of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds." The ritual was taken by W. Pro. W. J. Cottrell, Master of Marmora L.T.B. and Bro. A. Hart who kindly deputized as chaplain. The Lodge ceremonial closed with a verse and refrain of "The Sweet By and By" and the dropping by each member of a piece of blue ribbon on the casket. It is noteworthy that included amongst the large number of mourners were twenty-one members of the local True Blue Lodge. There were several beautiful floral emblems coming from the following—Family, Brothers and Sisters, Mr. and Mrs. J. Gray, L.T.B, 177, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Young and Mrs. McCaw, Mr. and Mrs. H R. Pearce, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Bennett, and Mr. W. J. Cottrell

Out of town relatives attending the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Edward McGarvey and daughter Aletha of Toronto; Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Mumby and two children of Niagara Falls, N. Y.; Mr. James Allen McGarvey of Niagara Falls, N.Y., and Mrs. Annie Hamilton of Toronto.

ALLAN McGARVEY *

About 9.30 o'clock Friday evening Allan McGarvey, a well known and esteemed resident of Marmora village, passed away very unexpectedly at his home here. Although he had suffered from ill health for several years, he was around as usual during the day and early part of the evening. After retiring he complained of a choking sensation and Dr. H. Crawford was summoned, but nothing could be done to relieve his condition and he passed away shortly afterwards.

The late Allan McGarvey was sixty-nine years of age and was born at Sheffield, Ontario, but had resided most of his life in Marmora. For years he worked for the Pearce Company, when they carried on extensive operations and later he was employed by Deloro S. & IR. Co. Ltd., until ill health forced him to give up work.

The deceased took a great interest in the various branches of the Orange Order. He was a member of Golden Star Royal Black Preceptory No. 746, a Past Master of Marmora L.O.L. 319, and before it became dormant he took an active interest in Marmora L.T.B. No. 177, being a Past Master and also a Past District Deputy Master. He was also a member of Marmora Council, No. 279, Canadian Order of Chosen Friends.

The late Mr. McGarvey leaves his widow, three daughters and one son to mourn his loss, as follows: Mrs. Nathan Mumby, Marmora; Mrs. Donald Robertson, Deloro; Mabel, at home; and James Allan McGarvey, Marmora. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. W. R. Gray and Mrs. A. Walters, Marmora, and Mrs. Edward McGarvey, Toronto.

The funeral was held on Monday afternoon and was held under the auspices of L.O.L. 319. Service was conducted in St. Paul's Church by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell, who delivered an impressive sermon. Favorite hymns were sung and Mr. L. R. Rundle and Mrs. P. Gray sang a duet, "Face to face with God my Saviour."

After the Church committal service had been conducted by Rural Dean A. B. Caldwell at the grave side the rites of the Orange Order were taken by Deputy County Master J. Morrison, acting as Master, Past District Deputy Master T. E. Potts, as Deputy Master and Past County Master W. J. Cottrell as Chaplain. Past County Marshal, John Bateman, was in charge of the parade. The large attendance and beautiful flowers were further evidence of the esteem in which the deceased was held. CORA MCGARVEY *

Fatally Injured by Auto

A most unfortunate accident occurred last Saturday evening on Madoc Street, a short distance east of the Continuation School, when Cora, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hilliard McGarvey, was struck by an auto driven by E. Spry With a companion she was walking along the road and a car driven by Mr. Geo. O'Neill, of Deloro, going west passed them. Almost immediately after the car driven by Mr. Spry came along, going East, and it is said that Cora ran out on the road in front of it, apparently not noticing the approaching car, which knocked her down and passed over her. Eye witnesses state that the Spry auto was only travelling at a moderate rate of speed and stopped in a short distance, when the occupants hurried back to the aid of the stricken child.

The victim of the accident was carried to the residence of Mr. T W. Rhind and Dr. Crawford was hastily summoned, but the child was dead before he arrived. The remains were then taken to F. N. Marett & Co's undertaking rooms and Dr. Beatty, newly appointed coroner of Madoc, was notified. He came over as soon as possible and arrangements were made for the holding of an inquest. The following were sworn in as a jury: C. A. Lummiss, foreman, D. Shannon, A. J. Shannon, Robert Nayler, W. D. Donnelly, Harold Nayler, and T. E. Pritchard. After viewing the body and visiting the scene of the accident where various measurements were taken, the inquest was adjourned until yesterday afternoon.

Cora was ten years of age. Besides her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hilliard McGarvey, she is survived by two brothers, Everett and Elden, and three sisters, Goldie, Verna and Gena, all at home. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, service being conducted in St. Paul's Church by Rev. A. B. Caldwell. The public school was closed for the afternoon and many of the children were present to pay their last respects to their schoolmate, as well as a large number of relatives and friends of the family.

Verdict of Accidental Death *

The inquest in connection with the death of the late Cora McGarvey was concluded yesterday afternoon. Coroner Dr. Beatty, of Madoc presided and Crown Attorney B. C. Donnan questioned the witnesses. After hearing the evidence the following verdict was arrived at by the jury: "That Cora McGarvey came to her death at the Tillage of Marmora, in the County of Hastings, on the 19th day of December A. D. 1931 as a result of injuries received when recently struck by a car driven by Everett Spry.'

Dr. H. Crawford gave evidence as to the injuries sustained which caused death and Prov. Constable Gray; Wm Spry, owner of the car; Everett Spry, driver at time of accident; Ed. Flynn, jr., the other occupant of the car; Geo. O'Neill, county constable, of Deloro; Lloyd Bailey, an eye witness of the accident, little Marjorie McInroy, who was with the deceased when the accident occurred, all gave evidence.

The evidence was all to the effect that the car was travelling at a moderate rate of speed, not more than 20 miles an hour, that the child ran out on the road in front of the car and that the accident was unavoidable as far as the driver of the car was concerned.

DAVID BELFORD McGARVEY *

The passing of David Belford McGarvey at his home in Marmora village at 1:45 a.m. on Wednesday, November 15th, removes a familiar figure from the life of this district. He had been in poor health for the past; three years and some months ago underwent an operation. Stricken with pneumonia recently, he failed to rally and passed away as stated. The late David McGarvey was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Mathew James McGarvey and was born in Marmora Township on February 13th, 1863. His parents came to this country from Ireland, his father being the first settler in what later became known as Shanick. His early years were spent in the lumber shanties. He worked in turn for the Gilmour, the Rathbun and the Pearce Companies. He contracted for the Rathbun Co. and was foreman for the Pearce Co. In 1913, while working for the latter Company, he sustained an injury to his right leg during a log jam which occurred while driving logs. Although this left him crippled he got around almost as smartly as those with uninjured limbs. He loved to converse with former work mates, and indeed with any who might comprise his audience, on his experiences and could tell many interesting stories relating to lumbering in those early days. He was an expert at log rolling and took pride in relating how, on a visit, to Michigan in the prime of his life, he defeated, the champion log roller of the United States in a contest. He was one of the best singers of shanty songs this district ever knew. In addition to his fondness for music he was also a great reader and he enjoyed a good argument. Passing away as he has, in the midst of the hunting season, recalls to mind the many hunts he had participated in with other members of the McGarvey family, who have always been renowned for their powers with a gun. He was one of the best marksmen and he had a good repertoire of hunting stories in which the bear as well as the deer figured. Following his career as a lumber man he took up carpentering and had worked on the Trent canal and also for the Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. Limited in that capacity for several years.

He was married to Mary Ann Reid daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Reid of Marmora township, who predeceased him on August 23rd, 1923. He was a member of St. Paul's Anglican Church and was a charter member of the now dormant Marmora L. T. B. Lodge No. 177, which he was largely instrumental in organizing.

He is survived by five children all resident in Marmora village. They are Matthew and Hilliard. Mrs. James Nobes (May), Mrs. William Smith (Laura) and Mrs. Alex Niblett (Estella). He is further survived by one sister, Mrs. Allan McGarvey, also of Marmora, and sixteen grandchildren.

The funeral will be held to-morrow (Friday) leaving his late residence for service at St. Paul's Church at 2 p.m., with Rev. J. M. Brownlie officiating. Interment will be made in the family plot in Marmora Protestant cemetery. -W. J. C (W.J. Cottrell)

GORDON McWILLIAMS *

It is our painful duty to record the death of one of Marmora's oldest, most popular and most widely known citizen, Mr. Gordon McWilliams who died early on Sunday morning. About five weeks ago he was taken ill on a farm that he was working a few miles north of the village. It is an isolated spot and he lay all the afternoon too ill to move. Since then he has been suffering severely most of the time partly unconscious, so that death came as a relief on Sunday morning. He suffered from Bright's disease and other complications.

Though his death was looked for with a good deal of misgivings, still it came as a shock to everyone. People couldn't realize that "Gord McWilliams" would be seen no more.

Nor will it be realized for many a day, not fully, until a new generation has sprung up and the older ones have taken their journey too across the dark river that all must face, perhaps some may be near now to the splashing of the waves.

You have all seen the old farm house beaten with rains and worn with time yet standing there homelike and secure. Time has covered it over with vines in which the birds love to twitter and behind which many a gentle word, many a loving hour has been spent. The sun has sunk to rest just over the hill so often. The old home has been a delightful place, more hallowed still from memories of the past. All about are trees and flowers and walks and touches of kindly human hands.

Gordon McWilliams always put me in mind of just such a place. His character was one of those old fashioned kindly, sociable, natural kinds that are so charming in a way yet difficult to describe. I came to Marmora but a few years ago hence it is impossible for me to feel as the old ones do who knew him year after year. Gord was a real friend to everybody. Did you ever hear anyone say a word against him? Did you ever know him to do one unkind act? No, I think not. He was just the man I wish I had the ability to paint. Not exceedingly clever perhaps, that's all the better. His gifts were of the heart. He had heart culture.

Kingsly says "There's nothing so kingly as kindness." Therefore our old friend was every inch a king. This class of person are apt to be deceiving; they are like a beautiful modest flower; they do not flash out on you to attract sudden attention but there's a perfection, a ripeness, a flavor, a perfume about them that sinks like music on the soul.

Gordon McWilliams was widely known because he was for so many years proprietor of the Royal Hotel. A hotel undoubtedly is an excellent place to develop a charitable nature and a kindly heart, that is if one's not overcome with the greed for gold that so many fall into. He did not develop this trait. His forte was in making the place real homelike to the traveller in all sorts and conditions of weather. If they wished to be merry he was not a dictator. They came and went and he did his part well. Strangely enough he was not a cynic. He never lost faith in humanity, as many do. He must have known men's weaknesses pretty well, but he loved them still. I do not think a handshake from him was ever a mere formality. It was genuine. Gordon McWilliams was typical of that picturesque, poetic generation, of men that is fast disappearing. In their place have men all action, all nerve, an embodiment of Darwin's law of the Survival of the Fittest.

He was 67 years of age and leaves a widow and family of grown up children. He was a member of Marmora Lodge A. F. & A. M. and his funeral on Tuesday was under Masonic direction. Service was conducted at St. Paul's Church by Rev. Mr. Harris. |

A few years ago he went out west and stayed there for some time and he also served overseas with the Canadian Army during a considerable part of the war.

The deceased had taken an active part in athletic sports ever since he was a comparatively young lad. He was particularly noted for his ability as a hockey and lacrosse player, especially the former, and was widely known all over the district as a result and was popular with the patrons of these sports.

"Peanuts" as he was so well known had not been in good health for some time, but few realized he was so ill, and word of his death came as a surprise and a source of real regret to many of his friends. Always friendly and good natured, he made many friends who will regret his early demise.

To his family his death comes as all the greater shock following the death of his brother, Chas. A. McWilliams, who also passed away in the prime of life a year or so ago. Two brothers, George of Estevan, Sask. And Arthur of Toronto, and five sisters survive him.
