ROSS EVERETT TANDY * Sept. 29, 1953

Toddling onto the highway in front of his home, Ross Everett Tandy, aged 15 months, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Tandy, Marmora, was instantly killed early Tuesday afternoon when struck by a passing car.

The accident occurred directly in front of The Tandy home on No. 14 Highway, one and a half miles south of Marmora.

Police said the little boy was struck by a northbound car, driven by Gordon Victor Thompson, 96 Wragge Street, Trenton. The impact rolled the lad's body about 60 feet up the highway. The dead boy had been playing with his brother, Terrance, aged 5, in front of their parents' home. A preliminary inquest was held Tuesday afternoon before Coroner Dr. R. S. Beattie, of Madoc, the hearing being adjourned until Tuesday, October 6th, The accident was investigated by Ontario Provincial Police Cpl. Jack Hatch, and Constable R. Devey, of Madoc.

ROSS EVERETT TANDY, * *Child Instantly Killed*

15 months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Tandy, was instantly killed on Tuesday afternoon, when struck by a car on No. 14 Highway in front of his parents' home, about a mile and a half south of the village'.

According to reports the child was struck by a car driven by Gordon Victor Thomson, 36 Wragge Street, Trenton, and proceeding northward.

The little -child was following his brother, aged 5, and ran in front of car. The body was rolled about 60 feet in front of the car. Provincial Police at Madoc were notified and Cpl. Jack -Hatch and Constable R. Devey investigated. Coroner Dr. R. S. Beatty, of Madoc, was notified and he ordered an inquest. A preliminary inquest was held Tuesday afternoon and adjourned until Tuesday, October 6th

INQUEST INTO DEATH OF ROSS TANDY *

Coroner Dr. S. R. Beatty, of Madoc, presided at an inquest in connection with the death of Ross Everett Tandy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Tandy, who was killed by an automobile driven by Gordon Thompson, of Trenton on Tuesday afternoon, September 29th.

The child was 15 months of age.

The enquiry was conducted by Cpl. J. Hatch, of Madoc, assisted by other officers from the detachment there The jury was composed of Major Percy Gray, D. P. Marett, Vaughan

Glover, James Walker and Carl Heath. Assistant Crown Attorney Gordon S. Robertson was in charge of the presentation of evidence.

After a quite extended session on Tuesday afternoon the inquest was adjourned until Wednesday afternoon at Madoc. The verdict of the jury was as follows: " . .

"We, the Jury empanelled to enquire into the death of Ross Everett Tandy, find that Ross Everett Tandy came to his death through injuries sustained by being struck by motor vehicle driven by Gordon Thompson on Highway .No. 14, September 29th, 1953, opposite the farm lane of Harry Neal, south of the village of Marmora, and find same to be accidental, but feel that the driver should have seen the child in view of the fact that he was not distracted by any other occurrence until he was 40 to 50 feet from the children on the east side of the highway."

VALENTINE TENNYSON *

On Sunday evening, after a few hours illness, Valentine Tennyson passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wellington Billings. He was in his 94th year and was the oldest man in Marmora township and one of the oldest, in this part of Ontario. The deceased was born at St. Andrews, Quebec, but came to Hastings county while a young man. He first resided near Madoc and was married to Rachel Baker, of Madoc township, who predeceased him in May 1909. For quite a number of years he engaged in farming in different parts of the township.

About twenty-nine years ago he moved to the farm now owned by Mr. Dennis McGrath, where he lived about ten years. Since that time he has lived with his daughter Mrs. W. Billings.

It is hard, especially for the younger generation, to realize the changes which took place during Mr. Tennyson's lifetime. For years after he came to Hastings county there was no railway or telephone or any other of the modern conveniences in this district. In fact oxen were more used for farm work than horses, and the usual mode of travelling was on foot or horseback.

Modern farm machinery was also unknown and nearly all work was done by hand, half a dozen men being required to do the work that one or two will now do with modern machinery.

Mr. Tennyson was a fine type of pioneer. Ready for hard work and the hardships the early settlers had to contend with, he was cheerful and contented and a fine neighbour, ready to help others in time of need. He made friends easily and retained their friendship and esteem.

The deceased was around until a couple of days before his death. Saturday morning he got up and dressed and came downstairs but shortly after Mrs. Billings noticed he was looking pale and asked him how he was feeling.

He complained that he felt very strange and seemed to lose the use of his limbs. He gradually weakened until the following evening, when he passed away.

Mr. Tennyson is survived by four daughters and three sons. They are Mrs. John Burns, Marmora; Mrs. A. Derry, Gilmour; Mrs. A. Bronson, Tacoma, Wash.; Mrs. Wellington Billings, Marmora township; Samuel, Schumaker, Ont.; Wallace, Waiteville, Sask.; and Jonah of the Sudbury district.

The funeral will be hold this afternoon. Service will be conducted In Marmora United Church and interment will take place in Marmora cemetery.

VALENTINE TENNYSON *

Marmora, Jan. 30 — The oldest resident of Marmora Township, as far as is known, passed away at six o'clock on Sunday evening at the residence of his son-in-law, Wellington Billings, in the person of Valentine Tennyson. Had he lived until July 30th, next, he would have, celebrated his ninety-fourth birthday. Valentine Tennyson, with the exception of a slight deafness, retained the use of all his faculties till the last. His last illness was of short duration, as he was only stricken ill on Saturday morning.

When Marmora's Memorial building was recently opened he was one of the interested spectators. He, however missed voting at the last township election which saw his son-in-law with whom he resided in the second concession head the poll. He will be missed by a host of friends because of his bright intellect, animated conversations and charitable acts.

He was born in St., Andrew's, Quebec the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Tennyson. His mother came, of Dutch descent and his father was at one time a teacher, who though English born, was able to speak French most fluently. When Valentine was thirteen, his parents moved to Madoc Township. Farming was his pursuit until 1905 when at the age of 69, he retired. He resided in Marmora village for five years, and then went to live with his son-in-law, Wellington. Billings. The late Mr. Tennyson was married to Rachael Baker, of Madoc Township in 1852 by the Methodist minister officiating in the Madoc district at that time. Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Tennyson, seven of whom survive. They are Samuel, of Timmons, Wallace of Waitville, Sask., Jonas of Sudbury; Mrs. John Burns of Marmora; Mrs. Wellington Billings, of Marmora Township; Mrs. Abe Derry, of Gilmour; and Mrs. Angus Bronson, of Tacoma, Wash. Two sons Robert and George, passed away several years ago while his wife predeceased him on May 17, 1909. One brother Philip, now in his seventy-ninth year, is resident in Toronto. A sister Mrs. Graham Weir, passed away in Peterboro about five years ago at an advanced age. Funeral arrangements are not yet complete, but the funeral service will be held at Marmora United church and the burial will be in the family plot in Marmora Protestant Cemetery.

WILLIAM EDWARD TERRION DROWNED *

A sad drowning accident occurred on Monday forenoon, as a result of which William Edward Terrion lost his life. Mr. Terrion and little son had been out fishing in a canoe and were returning when the accident occurred. There are several versions of the tragedy but no one appears to know just how it happened or the cause of it. Apparently, however, the deceased lost his balance in some way and fell out over the side of the canoe, which immediately rolled back so far that the little boy went out over the other side. Jas. Leonard, who was near in another canoe quickly rushed to the rescue and saved the lad, but the father went down and apparently never came up again,

Deceased was in the water for over an hour and the body was recovered by Alphonse Shannon, who with others was diving in an effort to locate it. The accident occurred near the stave mill just a few feet from one of the boat houses. Dr. Thomson and others did everything possible to resuscitate, him but to no avail.

The late William Edward Terrion was in his 34th year and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Edward (Francis?) Terrion, who survive: him. He leaves a widow formerly, Miss Bertha Watson, of Bancroft and a family of three little girls and. one son. He is also survived by five sisters and two brothers, as follows:-

Mrs. Jackson, Port Arthur; Mrs. W. Armstrong, Havelock; Mrs. William Arrow-Smith, Indiana; Margaret Helen, John and Francis, at home.

The family have the sympathy of the. whole community in their sad bereavement.

GEORGE H. THOMPSON**ACCIDENT PROVED FATAL**

The accident to George H. Thompson, which occurred at the Pearce Company's saw mill last Thursday afternoon, resulted in his death a few hours later. His head was cut to the scalp in two or three places and apparently the skull was fractured. There was also severe bruises on his arm and side. He never regained consciousness.

Deceased was born in England and spent his boyhood there. About seventeen years ago he came to Marmora and had been in the employ of the Pearce Company, Limited, ever since. He was held in high regard by his employers and he was a very efficient and energetic workman.

The late George Thompson was held in very high esteem by the people of Marmora. The better they knew him the more they appreciated his many admirable qualities. Always kindly and considerate he made many friends. He was quite a reader and thinker and an ideal citizen, always ready to assist in anything for the welfare of the community. His services were especially valuable in connection with fires. He was always in the forefront of the fire fighters and no position was too dangerous or difficult for him if it was necessary to obtain the best results.

He leaves a widow whose maiden name was Lily Penrose, and four children, the oldest being nine years of age. He is also survived by three brothers and three sisters all living in England.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of the whole community in their great loss.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon and was attended by a very large number. The service was conducted in the Methodist church by Rcv. W. P. Woodger and interment took place in Marmora cemetery.

INQUEST WAS HELD.

Coroner Dr. Bissonette of Stirling, was called to Marmora owing to the death of the late George H. Thompson as a result of an accident. He was of the opinion no inquest was necessary, but Mr. John Robertson asked that one be held, and after consultation with the Crown Attorney the Coroner decided to grant, his request.

On Friday evening a jury was empanelled the following being sworn in: G. B. Airhart, Dan Shannon, Wm. Gray, F. K. Marett, C. A. Bleecker, H. W. Sabine, W. A. Sanderson, Wm. Ploughman, C. W. Gladuey and David Simmons. Mr. Airhart was elected foreman. The jury first viewed the remains. Dr. Thomson explaining the nature of the injuries, and then proceeded to the saw mill, where the accident occurred and examined the shaft on which the deceased's clothing caught. The inquest was then adjourned until Tuesday afternoon.

When the inquest resumed on Tuesday afternoon Mr. Carnew, Crown Attorney, was present, and assisted Dr. Bissonette in conducting the investigation. The witnesses called were H. R. Pearce, Chas. Emigh, Fred Holland, Jas. Gray, E. Arnold and Dr. Thomson. After hearing the evidence the jury unanimously returned the following verdict:

We, the Coroner's Jury, empanelled to enquire when, where, how and by what means the late, George H. Thompson came to his death, beg leave to report as follows:

."We find that George H. Thompson came to his death on June 2nd, 1921, at the Pearce Company's saw mill, Marmora, Ont., by having his clothing caught in set screw which was projecting from a collar on a revolving shaft, the result being he was hurled violently around the shaft an indefinite number of times, which rendered him unconscious and resulted in his death about four hours later.

We also find that the late George H. Thompson was a very efficient and conscientious workman, probably causing him to be over anxious about his work and perhaps take unnecessary risks. We also find from the evidence given us that his employers, The Pearce Company Limited, have been reasonably careful about having safeguards and other necessary precautions for the safeguarding of their employees, and have complied as far as possible with the Provincial Inspector's recommendations.

Weekend search ends in tragedy

A weekend long search ended in tragedy about 5:15 p.m. on Monday night after OPP divers located the body of Alfriede Tozar, 54, of Marmora, after she went missing early Friday morning.

On Friday, Jan. 19, Alfriede of 17 Mary Street in Marmora left her residence at about 11 a.m. and failed to return.

OPP have no clues as to why she entered the river after leaving her car. Family members arrived at the scene shortly after Alfriede was found in the river and positively identified the body.

She was wearing a 3/4 length dark brown mink coat, dark brown mid-calf winter boots with a zipper front and sheep skin lining made by Morland, black slacks and a yellow/grey high neck blouse. She had a small gold watch with a black wrist band and was wearing a wedding and engagement ring made of yellow gold.

Mrs. Tozer's vehicle was found along the river bank just passed the pump house. An intense two day search last weekend of the Crowe River by OPP ended in the discovery of the woman's body just south of the Highway No. 7 bridge.

Involved with the search were divers from District 9 (Belleville) and District 10; officers from Madoc and Sharbot Lake, the Marmora, Marmora and Lake Volunteer Fire Department, and the Crowe Valley Conservation Authority.

Employees of the CVCA were requested to add logs to the dam to build up the water level on the north side before divers continued their search on Saturday.

An intense ground search was conducted on Sunday and involved area police as well as the volunteer fire department.

Searching the river became increasingly difficult on Sunday as the ice was thick in some areas. Despite the efforts of both the OPP and the fire department to break up the ice, about half of the river remained covered. Continued efforts resulted in the removal of ice by OPP which allowed divers to locate the body about dinner time on Monday.
