ARNOLD EDWARD WALKER *

The passing of Arnold Edward Walker on Sunday morning came as a shock to his family and many friends in the community. He had eaten his breakfast and shortly after did not feel well and called a doctor. He passed away a few minutes later as the result of a heart attack. He was in his 57th year. Mr. Walker was born near Madoc, a son of the late Royal Walker and his wife, the former Clara Pelow, now Mrs. Al. Sparks.

He was a mechanic by trade and as a young man was employed in Oshawa for a time, moving to Bancroft about 30 years ago where he was in the garage business. In 1944 he moved with his family to Marmora and for some time operated a garage where the Cities Service Station is now. Later he built a large garage at the south end of the village which he operated until last year when he sold the building. He and his son Murray had recently opened a body repair, shop between their houses on Bursthall Street South.

The late Mr. Walker always took a keen interest in community affairs. For a number of years he served on the Council and he was the local fire chief for several years. He was a member of Marmora Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 222. He was popular as a businessman and as a citizen. Besides his wife, the former Phoebe Gifford, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. A. Sparks, of Tweed; one daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Snider (June) of Vennachar; three sons, James and Murray, Marmora, and Robert, who is attending Royal Military College, Kingston. There are also five sisters: Mrs. Percy Embury (Vera) Marmora; Mrs. William Brown (Ruth) Peterborough; Mrs. R. Lalonde (Alice) Tweed; Mrs. James Huxtable (Lila) Oshawa, and Mrs. Elwood Stevenson (Laura) Brockland.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon from the Howden Funeral Home to St. Andrew's United Church where service was conducted by Rev. P. O. Miller, pastor of Marmora Free Methodist church, assisted by clergymen from that area. Rev. L. C. Ball, a former minister, delivered a very impressive sermon. The church was filled to capacity and several were unable to get in, a tribute to the esteem and respect in which the deceased was held in the community. Interment was in Marmora Protestant Cemetery. The pall bearers were all members of the Masonic Order and were Wor. Bro. Sid Sandham, Wor. Bro. D. P. Marett, Wor. Bro. F. R. Loveless and Bros. Robt. Maynes, Vaughan Glover, and Stan Kerr.

Marmora Loses Prominent Citizen

Mr. Joseph H Warren Dies After Lengthy Illness – Was First Reeve of Village

After a lingering illness which baffled the skill of the ablest physicians, Mr. Joseph Henry Warren passed quietly away at his one, Main Street, Marmora, about nine o'clock on Monday evening, August 15th 1910, in his 53rd year. The late Mr. Warren was born near the town of Colborne on Oct. 16th, 1857 and spent his early life there. When a young man, he went to Colborne, where he learned the trade, of carriage maker and blacksmith. After learning his trade, he started in business for himself in Colborne, and after remaining there a short time, he moved to Marmora where he has resided ever since.

For quite a number of years, he has taken an active interest in Municipal politics and has been a member of Marmora Village Council for a longer period than any other man. He was the first Reeve of the Village after it was incorporated, the first council for 1901 being composed of Jos. H. Warren, Reeve, and Councillors, John Dempsey, W.H. Hubble, Daniel Dunlay and John McWilliams. Mr. Warren was again elected Reeve for the following year, and with the exception of one term, has been a member ever since. He was always conscientious in the performance of his duties and took an active interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of the Village.

Deceased was also a prominent member of the local orange lodge, being presented with a Past Master Jewel a few years ago. He was also a member of Marmora Lodge No. 222, A.F. & A.M. His kindly disposition and strict business integrity won him the esteem of all who came in contact with him and his death will be regretted by a large circle of friends.

About thirty years ago deceased was united in marriage to Miss Hanna Bailey, who was a resident of Colborne, at the time, and who only lived a few years. Five children resulted from this union as follows: Albert of Deloraine, Man; Harry and Cecil of Marmora, Mrs. John Simpson of Trenton and Miss Cora at home.

About twenty years ago, Mr. Warren was again married to Miss Elsie A. Weese, who with a family of five children is left to mourn the loss of a loving husband and father. Deceased is also survived by four brothers and two sisters as follows: Messrs. George and John, of Toronto, William who lives in the West and Robert, of Marmora; Mrs. Barnecutte, of Manvers; and Mrs. Could, of Cobourg. ROYAL THOMAS WARREN *

On Saturday afternoon, December 16th, Royal Thomas Warren passed away in Belleville General Hospital at the ripe old age of 84 years and 6 months. He was Marmora's oldest continuous resident and had lived all his life on the same lot in the village, although the original residence was removed and a new one erected. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Warren, who were among Marmora's oldest residents, long before the village was given its present name and for years it was known as "The Works", as ore from Blairton Iron Mine was smelted here by charcoal.

Until recent years he enjoyed good health and was a very active worker. He was a painter and paper hanger by trade and for a long period many of the houses in Marmora were painted and decorated by him. He also worked at Deloro, especially during the summer months, painting and papering residences there for Deloro Smelting & Refining Co. Limited and also painting Company buildings.

The late Thomas R. Warren or Tom, as he was best known for many years, took an active interest in municipal affairs. For some years he was a member of the Public School Board and later of the Village Council. He was friendly and kindly, but was also very outspoken for any cause he supported. He was always ready to support anything he believed was in the best interests of the village. Advanced in years, he was very enthusiastic over the decision of Bethlehem Steel Corporation first to start exploration work here and later their decision to open a mine.

He was an ardent Mason and the oldest member of Marmora Lodge A.F. & A.M. No. 222. For nearly fifty years he was one of the most regular attendants at its meetings. In 1948 he was presented with a Grand Lodge jewel, which is presented to those who have been a member of the Craft for over 50 years. He was also an honored guest of the Chamber of Commerce on a number of occasions. He was a member of St. Andrew's United Church and formerly of the Methodist Church.

His wife, the former Anne Pressley, predeceased him nineteen years ago. He is the last member of his parent's family and is survived by one daughter Grace, who has kept house for him since his wife's death.
