Mrs. Josephine Agnes Fink

Funeral of Mrs. John Fink of 840 Dundas Street, East, Whitby who died on Monday, June 10th at Oshawa General Hospital was held Thursday, June 12th from the Town Funeral Home to St. John the Evangelist Church where Requiem Mass was celebrated. Mrs. Fink had been in failing health for the last ten years.

Born at Deloro in 1924, she was the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Paquet. She received her education at Marmora High School and Peterborough Normal School, and taught at Malone, Ignace, Matawa and Sudbury.

Her married life was spent mainly in Sudbury and more recently in Cochrane until moving to Whitby last year. She was a member of the Catholic Women's League.

MR. JOHN ALFRED PAQUET

A well known and highly respected citizen of Marmora Village passed away at Belleville General Hospital on March 10th, 1965 in the person of Mr. John Alfred Paquet in his 79th year.

Mr. Paquet was born in Trenton in 1885, the son of the late Lawrence Paquet and Caroline Taillon.

With his parents he moved to Hawkesbury, Ontario, in 1896 where he obtained his primary education in the Hawkesbury Separate and High Schools and finally his formal education at McGill University in Montreal.

His first employment was with the CPR on double tracking operations between Montreal and Smiths Falls. On completion of that project, Mr. Paquet joined the Algoma Central Railway at Hobon, Ontario, as Resident Engineer on construction and in 1912 rejoined the CPR as Resident Engineer on construction at Chappleau and Sudbury, Ontario.

World War 1 brought to a halt all railroad construction operations in Canada and Mr. Paquet then joined the staff of the Deloro Smelting and Refining Co. at Deloro, which led to his settling in Marmora and Deloro in 1915 and 1919 respectively. He eventually became Manager of Stellite Operations. He retired in 1955 and made his home in Marmora.

Mr. Paquet was a faithful member of Sacred Heart Parish and of the Holy Name Society.

Mr. Paquet was twice married. His former wife, Nina A. Driscoll, died in 1943 and he is survived by his present wife, the former Marion A. Byrnes, three sons and three daughters: Lawrence, of Montreal, Daniel of Lindsay, Eugene of Oakville, Mary of Toronto, Anne (Mrs. George Rebstock) of Crystal Beach and Josephine (Mrs. J. M. Fink) of Sudbury; also two step-children, Mrs. Peter Scott of Belleville and Thomas D. Byrnes with the RCMP in Winnipeg. There are also ten grandchildren. One brother, Alec of Kingston, survives him and a brother and an adopted sister predeceased him, Alphonse of Kitchener and Josephine (Mrs. McGibbon) of Montreal.

The funeral was held Friday morning, moving from Cassidy's Funeral Home to Sacred Heart Church and the services were conducted by Rev. Father W. P. Healey

The late Mrs. Paquet is survived by three sons, Alex, of Winnipeg; Fred, of town, and Alphonse with the Canadian forces in Siberia.

The funeral took place on Monday, service being conducted in the Church of the Sacred Heart by Rev. Father Murtagh, after which the remains were interred in the R. C. cemetery.

Jury Verdict is Accidental Death

Accidental death was the verdict of the coroner's jury enquiring into the death of Nelson Paquette, Madoc mine employee, who died in the Belleville General Hospital as the result of injuries sustained, when he fell down the shaft at Craig gold mines on Aug. 2nd last.

The inquest into the death of the late Nelson Paquette was held in Madoc last Friday evening before Coroner Dr. S. Eagleson, with Crown Attorney B. C. Donnan, K.C., conducting the investigation. Fellow workers, Harry White-man and John Connors, testified in the relationship to the fatal accident, both stating that the platform upon which the deceased man was working became dislodged and caused him to fall 35 feet down a 245 foot shaft resulting in the injuries that proved fatal.

The verdict rendered by the Coroner's jury was to the effect that the late Nelson Paquette came to his death in the Belleville Hospital on Aug. 2nd as the result of injuries received at the Craig Gold Mines when a platform became dislodged, causing him to fall a distance of 35 feet.

SUDDEN DEATH

Mr. L. A. Paquet Passes Away Unexpectedly Last Friday Morning

Shortly before noon on Friday, May 14th, his friends in the village were shocked to learn that Mr. Lawrence A. Paquet had died suddenly at the home of his son Mr. Fred Paquet, Forsythe street, with whom he has resided for some time. Although he had only been a resident of the village for a few years Mr. Paquet had made many warm friends. His kindly disposition and sense of humor quickly won the good will and friendship of those he came in contact with.

The late L. A. Paquet was born in St. Charles, Quebec, in 1850. For a number of years before coming to Marmora he resided in Hawkesbury, Ont. He was married to Miss Taillon, a sister of Mrs. John Shannon and Mrs. Hugh Shannon, of Marmora, who with three sons survives him. The sons are Alexander, of Ottawa; Fred, of Marmora; and Alphonse, until recently of Berlin, Ont. Four brothers and two sisters also survive to mourn his loss.

Deceased had been in failing health for some years and suffered from bronchitis for about a week before his death, but no one thought his condition to be serious. He attended mass in the R. C. church on Ascension Day, the day previous to his death, and was afterwards down street.

The funeral took place on Monday, the remains being conveyed to the Church of the Sacred Heart, where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Murtagh. Interment in the R. C. cemetery.
