## JOSEPH L. PROVOST

The village of Marmora lost a respected citizen on Sunday morning, August 17, in the person of Joseph Leopold Provost. He passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterborough in his 69th year. Native of St. John's Quebec, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Simon Provost. Thirty-four years of his life was spent in Ontario. He was an employee of the Ontario Rock Quarry at Preneveau, for two years. He moved to Montreal for about a year and a half and then returned to Ontario to become an employee for the Deloro Smelting and Refining Company Limited for two periods totalling 28 years. He was greatly liked by fellow employees and neighbours for his friendly nature. He was a devout member of the Sacred Heart Church.

He was married to the former Rose Grenier, who was born at St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, and survives him. Of thirteen children born of the marriage, six survive him namely, Leo, Marmora township; Roger, Gerald and Fernard at home; Robert, Orillia and Mrs. R. Le May (Theresa), Toronto. Also surviving are three sisters residing in Montreal, Mrs. H. Collette, Mrs. John Dupuis and Mrs. A. Desloges.

The funeral took place on Wednesday, August 20th, when Rev. Father Scanlon, who is assisting Father J. A. O'Neill at present, sang Requiem Mass in Sacred Heart cemetery.

The pall bearers were his four sons, Leo, Roger, Gerald and Fernard, Jules Either and Ed Warren.

Among those from out of town attending the funeral were Mrs. Ducharme and daughter, Madeline, of Montreal; Miss Mary Bertrand, Toronto; Mrs. Roger Provost, Brockville, and Mr. and Mrs. R. Le May, Toronto.

Immediately after the funeral Mrs. Joseph L. Provost and family motored to Montreal owing to the death of Mrs. Provost's father, Ekinne Bremier, who passed away just twelve hours after Mr. Provost. The late Mr. Bremier visited Marmora for a time on two occasions and in the following years recalled his visits with pleasure.

Leo Joseph Provost Sr. of RR 1 Marmora passed away at a family home on Feb. 25 after a brief illness. He was 81 years old.

Mr. Provost was born in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, to the late Joseph Provost and Rose Grenier. He was predeceased by his wife Annie Lucas.

Mr. Provost moved to Preneveau, near Havelock, in 1923, after spending his youth in Quebec where he received his education (Montreal). He worked as a Stationery Engineer at the Marmoraton Mine until his retirement in 1972. He was a member of the St. Paul's Anglican Church in Marmora.

He will be sadly missed by his children Leo and Victor, of Marmora; Annette Taylor, Ruth Potts and Mary Provost, of Stirling; Jeanne Brown of Gananoque, and Shirley Read of Etobicoke.

He also leaves behind his sister, Theresa Lemay of Toronto, and his brothers Robert of Toronto and Fernand of Wawa, Ontario.

Funeral Services were held Feb. 27 at the St. Paul's Anglican Church in Marmora at 1 p.m., with the Rev. Robert Wright officiating. Interment was at Zion Cemetery in Marmora Township.
